Mr. Stanley Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Mr. Speaker, I should like first of all to thank the hon. member for Parry Sound-Muskoka for seconding this motion. The fifth report, concurrence in which we now ask, consists of only one sentence; therefore perhaps I might read it:

Your committee recommends that the provisional standing orders and recommendations contained in your committee's second report, concurred in by the house on April 20, 1964, which are now in effect until the end of May, be continued in effect until the end of the present session, unless it is otherwise ordered by the house.

The provisional standing orders and recommendations referred to in the second report are those under which we are now operating with respect to questions prior to the calling of the orders of the day, debate on adjournment motions three nights a week, and the handling of notices of motions for the production of papers. Under the decision of the house taken on April 20, 1964, these are in effect until the end of this month. It is the feeling of your committee, Mr. Speaker, that the house would like to continue the trial period for these standing orders and recommendations until the end of the present session, and if this report is concurred in, that will be the effect.

Mr. G. H. Aiken (Parry Sound-Muskoka): Mr. Speaker, I think it is significant that this motion is moved and seconded by members of the opposition, indicating at least our very sincere efforts to see that something effective is done to restore the prestige and effectiveness of parliament and to repair damage previously done. In addition, Mr. Speaker, I do believe that having new rules themselves is not sufficient, and that in addition to following them we must give effect to the spirit of the rules already in existence. It has been indicated so far this session that we do intend to do our best to carry out the intent of the rules and perform the business of parliament.
