tion with the Stadium is immediate and imperative.

Questions as to comparative building costs on the two sites were asked and answered by Mr.ROSS and Mr.GLassoo.

Mr. John COPELAND expressed the opinion that if the belief of the Building Committee that the centre of student activities will remain on the Campus for many years is well founded and khak if adequate accommodation is provided at the Stadium then nothing remained to be said on the subject.

Miss HURLBATT spoke particulary upon the following points:

- 1. That the question of providing accommodation for women students in the new building should be eliminated.
- 2. That we ought not to be content with the present plank of one-hour periods for gymnasium work.
- 3. That the use of the campus for such a building might be an infringement on academic requirements.
- 4. That anything which would tend to close in the Campus and so lose to the public one of our few park spaces would be a pity.

Dr.LAMB then replied to some of the points raised.

Sir ARTHUR CURRIE promised that the views expressed would be placed before the Committee of the Board of Governors.

The meeting then closed.
