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DIRECTIONS FOR TRANSPLANTING FRUIT TREES, &c.

The year being large, any three feet in diameter, cut and a half deep, cast away the bottom part of earth, fill up the hole to a proper height to receive the tree, so that the upper roots may be covered with three or four inches of earth when finished to a level with the general surface of the earth, with the best earth which may have a rich part of well rotted manure blended with it, place your tree properly (having previously pruned any gnarled or mangled parts from the roots), to the north east side of a stake placed in the middle of the hole for that purpose, cover with surface soil, shaking the tree, so that the roots are separately extended in their natural direction, and that fine earth surrounds them in every part. A pal of water may advantageously be turned in after the hole is nearly filled, put in the remainder, tread down the earth, and finish by leaving a small hole for man or bean around the tree, to conduct the summer showers to the roots. (If planted in the fall, the basin may be omitted.) Tie the tree firmly to the stake with a band of straw or hay.

CURSORY REMARKS.

Trees planted either in the fall or the spring should have a thorough pruning in May following, and neither waste, grass, or any other thing should be allowed to grow near them.—Bulbous Roots, generally, may be planted from July to November.—Orders will be punctually attended to.—Trees and Plants carefully labelled, packed, and delivered at the City of Toronto, (free of charge) to be forwarded by water or otherwise, so may be directed.
