MEXICAN REBELS WIN BLOODY BATTLE AND WILL ATTACK TORREON IN A FEW DAYS

Panama Tolls Exemption Will Be Repealed—White's Budget Speech Delayed—Liberal Newspapers Attack Seely

WILSON FORCES WIN FACTION STRUGGLE

Test Votes Clearly Indicate That Panama Tolls Policy Will Be Sustained Despite Vehement Opposition of Influential Democratic Leaders—Triumph Personal One

WASHINGTON, March 27.—President Wilson today won the opening skirmish of the greatest legislative battle of his administration when the house, over bitter protests from the recognized Democratic leaders, and almost solid minority opposition, adopted a special rule for the consideration of the bill repealing the free tolls provision of the Panama Canal Act. Speaker Clark, Democratic Leader Underwood, Republican Leader Mann and Progressive Leader Murdock were at the head of those lined up against the administration, but the house responded to the president's personal appeal for prompt consideration of the repeal bill as a means of supporting his administration's foreign policy.

Nothing to compare with the scenes today had occurred in the house since the famous "cannon rules fight" four years ago. In vain Representative Underwood took the floor of the house and urged his colleagues to vote against the rule. The rank and file Democrats, after listening to three hours of passionate argument, swung into the president's column, 195 of them voting to prevent the amendment of the special rule, while but 55 followed the leaders in joining with the minority in opposition.

Tonight administration supporters considered the crucial point passed, and jubilantly predicted the passage of the repeal bill itself Tuesday or Wednesday by a majority of more than one hundred. Several of the twenty hours allowed for debate under the rule had been consumed when the house adjourned, and with the speech-making continuing without interruption.

LIBERALS WILL REFORM ARMY

Curragh Incident Makes Certain Program of Democratization, and Removal of Class Privilege.

LONDON, March 27.—The New Statesman says the resignations of the cavalry officers "has turned every supporter of the government into an enthusiastic, determined army reformer." The newspaper adds that the need for the democratization of the executive ranks of the army and the abolition "of the absurd conditions which practically restrict the selection of officers in most of the regiments to those having private means has been recognized for generations."

APPEAL SOON ON ISSUE.
DERBY, Eng., March 27.—James Henry Thomas, labor member of parliament for Derby, addressing a large meeting here tonight, said it was certain that before many months there would be an appeal to the country and that the dominant issue would be whether the country should be governed by its elected representatives or the army "as a tool of the aristocracy."

ON A ROCK
The ultimate result of the issue, Mr. Thomas declared, would be that the highest command in the army will be open to the humblest recruit.

MORE DELAY IN MAKING DEAL WITH C.N.R.

Budget Speech Delayed in Consequence of Railway's Tardiness in Supplying Information Desired by Finance Minister—"Segregated Assets" May Furnish Security for Loan.

OTTAWA, March 27.—There seems to be some hitch or delay, at least, in the Canadian Northern negotiations. It had been expected that the prime minister would be able to present the formal proposals to the cabinet tomorrow, but it was stated tonight by a member of the government that some information demanded by the finance department has not yet been furnished, and that Sir William Mackenzie had been notified by the premier that it would be impossible for the government to act until the minister of finance had been put in possession of the required information.

REBEL LOSS HEAVY
Gen. Villa does not yet know his own loss, except that it was heavy. The wounded suffered terribly from thirst, and many died for lack of water and surgical attention.

VILLA LED LAST ASSAULT
Last night the third and final assault was delivered. Gen. Villa, grimy with dust and sweat, a red bandana handkerchief about his neck, participated. He rode up and down the lines swearing and cheering, cursing and calling on the saints. At times he apparently was calm and again furious. Thru it all he urged his men forward and all seemed to realize that the attack was the last one.

Saluted by Wounded.
On the way into the city from El Verjel this morning and particularly in the streets of the town itself Gen. Villa was constantly called on to return the salutes of the wounded.
