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forcement from Europe - from the West-Indies - and from the Southward (after operation should cease in that quarter) - added to what I might be able to spare at the time from the small force under my immediate command at New-York) was calculated to make a fair and folid effort in favour of our friends - in a diffrict where I had some reafon to believe they were numerous and hearty; and where I judged it might be made with little danger, even from a temporary naval superiority of the enemy. This plan had been fuggested to the Minister in the 1780, and more particularly explained to him in 1781; notwithstanding which a preference was given to another, (Appendix, No. I.) which feemed to be
