BERLIN, Dec. 6 .- (Special) -- The Waterloo County Canadian Club held their second banquet of the season tonight and were addressed by H. H. Stevens, M.P., of Vancouver, who

spoke on "Immigration."

He said the greatest peril of the age was the awakening of the Oriental and the lethingy of the Occ dent.
