

EXHIBITION PLANS ABOUT COMPLETED

Women Press Representatives Shown Over Grounds by Officials.

MANY NEW FEATURES

Government Exhibits and War Work Department Will Be Prominent.

Something of the pleasure and profit which are to meet visitors to the great National Exhibition during the coming weeks of Canada's big fair were glimpsed by the women of the press who yesterday made a partial tour of the grounds and buildings, accompanied by John G. Kent, manager, and T. A. Russell, president.

Among the first things to strike the eye is the beauty and order of the grounds, which this year seem more conspicuous even than usual, accustomed as the public is to seeing both at their best in the Exhibition area.

The group of buildings were for the most part receiving finishing touches from many workers, but even in the middle of the pleasant confusion of the music of many hammers and the brisk movements of the workmen, it was a pleasant place to visit.

What will undoubtedly prove one of the greatest attractions during the entire two weeks will be the space in the process of building, which is to be used for showing what can be done in the matter of vocational training for soldiers.

Attractive in its setting of white tents, flags and everything which makes many original devices in stone, wood and metal, the 2nd Canadian Depot Battalion, stationed at the camp of 500 soldiers, has been selected as the model for the vocational training.

MAJOR J. H. BULL, D.S.O., HAD A NOTED CAREER

A cable received yesterday by Mrs. B. H. Bull, 3 Meredith crescent, from the Perkins Bull Hospital, at Putney Heath, England, conveys the news that her son, Major Jeffrey Harper Bull, D.S.O., has been killed in action. Eighteen months ago he was home on brief and special leave of absence from the battlefields of France.

THUGS ENTER CAFE AND BEAT WAITER

Three Gum-Shoe Men Attack Attendant in Early Morning.

SECURED NO BOOTY

Lone Worker, With Roll in Pocket, Puts Up Great Fight.

Wearing gum-soled shoes to deaden their footsteps and with peak caps pulled well down over their faces, three unknown men entered the restaurant owned by Lattif Aldin, King street and Spadina avenue, early yesterday morning, and after attacking and badly beating up H. Aldin, who was in the cafe at the time, made a successful get-away without any booty.

Lattif Aldin, the proprietor of the cafe, had just left the building with the day's receipts in his pocket, leaving his brother in charge. When leaving the building he noticed the three men standing outside, smoking cigars, but he thought nothing of it at the time.

Major Bull is one of the well-known family which has bravely done its bit in the great war. He went overseas originally as captain in the 7th Battalion, Col. Beckett's command. After only one month in the trenches he was promoted to major.

After about a month in France, he was made a major, John Bull, as he was known to his university contemporaries, was a member of the National Liberal Club in London, England. He was a member of the Ionia Lodge, A.E. & A.M., Brampton. For years he was a member of the Grace Methodist Church, Brampton, where he was president of the young men's Bible class.

Lieut. Hugh Hoyle, who is reported to have been killed in action while leading his men in a bold advance, was the son of Dr. N. W. Hoyle, K.C., principal of the law school at Osgoode Hall. At the time of his enlistment he was general manager of the Bell Telephone Company in Montreal. He was held in high esteem by a host of friends.

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MIMICO PRISON GUARD KILLED BY LIGHTNING

Returning from his work at the Mimico Prison Farm, where he was employed as a guard, Richard Skidmore, a man about 19 years of age, was struck by lightning about 6.30 last night. Skidmore had left the Mimico suburban car at Stop 10, and struck across the fields in an effort to reach his home a little earlier than by going by the road, and was in the open field when he met his death.

GERMAN LEADERS FEAR REVOLUTION

Ludendorff Employs Agencies to Stamp Out Glowing Spark.

British Headquarters in France, Aug. 21.—Germany's military leaders now have become distinctly worried over the prospects of a revolution in Germany. General Ludendorff, in a captured secret order, has taken steps to employ the assistance of his commanding officers and various governmental agencies to help him stamp out the glowing spark which has been seen. The order, which is more illuminating than anything which has come out of Germany in many months, follows:—

KINGSTON'S ALLOTMENT OF COAL

Kingston, Aug. 21.—Mayor Hughes has been notified by R. C. Harris, Toronto, fuel controller for Ontario, that Kingston's allotment of anthracite coal for the coming winter is 48,100 tons, which is several thousand tons below the normal requirements.

RUMANIANS AND MONTENEGRINS JOIN CZECHO-SLOVAKS IN ITALY

Washington, Aug. 21.—Rumanian and Montenegrin soldiers are joining the Czecho-Slovak troops now fighting on the Italian front. An official dispatch today says all technical difficulties have been removed and Italian army officials are greatly pleased with this addition to their forces.

GUELPH IS HARD HIT

Guelph, Aug. 21.—The largest casualty list of Guelphics killed and wounded at the front for many months was received here this morning. It contained the names of four men killed in action and four others wounded. This makes a total of over 20 casualties inside of the last week.
