
Ottawa, Oct. 2 .- The government's bill to re-classify the civil service got its second reading tonight, and will go to a select committee. The committee is not likely to report or the bill to pass at this session, as prorogation is expected next week. Still, the house has affirmed its belief in civil service reform and the elimina-


tion of party partonage. The majority of the house were probably in favor of a return to the patronage system, and it looked for a time today as tho the government was up against 'something like an insur-rection. Many o.d line Conservatives came out flat-footed against the bill, and against the application of the civil service act to the outside service. Hon, A. K. Maclean, who was leading the house: W. F. Maclean of South York and Dr. Steele of South Perth were almost the only outsooken champions of the bill, tho it received some sup-port from Dr. Manion and other Unionists. Many Bitter Speeches.
