They would, therefore, lose in the minting; they would have a more expensive mode of manufacturing coins than at present, and they would displace our present currency, and be obliged to go on the market and borrow money, which, under the present system, the public were disposed to give to the Government to-day without interest. The people of Canada did not want gold; the note system was a much more convenient form of currency.
