

"BOUNDARY" AND ROSSLAND

Mines on Kettle River Will Shortly Be Shipping as Much Ore as Le Roi Et Al.

MADE HIS FORTUNE OUT WEST.

How One Young Canadian Succeeded on the Pacific Slope—Sales of Mining Stocks.

In the person of Mr. R. J. Jennings of Portland, Oregon, The World yesterday came across an incarnated proof of the wisdom of the old saying, "Go west, young man." Mr. Jennings, who is now a big, hearty man on the right side of life's merry-go-round, was born and brought up in Spencer, a small village back of Prescott, Ont. Nearly two decades ago he arrived at manhood, and started out to pursue fate and fortune. By a singular coincidence he recrossed his father's threshold just eighteen years to a day from the date on which his wanderings began. He found his father and mother grown very old, but still alive to welcome him home. The little hills about the old place had grown small in comparison with the big mountains of the Pacific Coast, but his worldly wealth had developed in inverse ratio. All the time he was away he had been mining, and today he is a chief owner in the Helena gold mine, situated in Bonanza camp, on the Southern Pacific Railway, 140 miles south of Portland. This is a free milling proposition, boasting a vein from 6 to 10 feet in width, and carrying the precious metal in a form perfectly visible to the naked eye.

According to Mr. Jennings, the Helena is a wonder, for from one taken out in development work it is with a five-stamp lease and a month in dividends. The milling capacity is being doubled. Mr. Jennings has a brother, F. J., who is first vice-president of the Portland Mining Exchange. His visit east is one of pleasure, and while in town he is being entertained by Mr. F. G. Morley of the Toronto Mining Exchange.

BOUNDARY'S BIG MINES

Will Ship as Much as Rossland—Five Dollars a Ton, It is Said, Will Pay.

The World has the following advice dated Columbia, B.C., Aug. 25: The Granby Smelter started operations on the 21st and has been running most successfully day and night ever since. There has been no hitch or trouble of any kind, either in the machinery or the treatment of the ores. The ores principally treated are those of the Knob Hill and Ironsides, with a little from the City of Paris. The two former can be treated very cheaply, as they require neither roasting nor flux, and are hence self-fluxing, which saves considerable cost in the smelting charges.

Mr. Miner gives assurance that shortly they will treat ore so cheaply that \$5 per ton will cover mining, freight and treatment, so that any going over \$5 will be profit. This will revolutionize the mining industries of the district.

At present there is only one furnace in operation, and this treats about 200 tons per day. The second furnace will be started in ten days, when there will be between 400 and 500 tons daily shipped from these properties.

The Knob Hill and Ironsides have turned out much richer than expected from the smelter returns, and these will rank as two of the biggest and most valuable mining properties in British Columbia.

The B. C. mine is also shipping daily, and inside of three weeks the owners expect to be shipping from the property nearly 200 tons a day, so that by the middle of September the Granby Smelter will have a daily shipment of 800 tons, and will hence rank near to Rossland as a mineral producer. This means that properties now lying dormant will be started and other properties being partially developed will have an increased number of men employed to develop the same.

The undoubted success of the Knob Hill and Ironsides has created a sensation in the district, and mining experts now predict that the Boundary will be one of the richest mining sections on this continent.

Mining properties in the Boundary district will now be eagerly sought after. Mining experts are watching with intense interest for the success or non-success from the smelter's standpoint of the enormous bodies of low grade ores of the Knob Hill and Ironsides. Messrs. Miner & Graves deserve success for their pluck, energy and enterprise in bringing these properties to their present position.
