informed by Quartermaster-Sergeant O'Grady that our expenses while in camp would be 25 cents per day, per man, and 15 cents for extra meal, which was breakfast, which would make a total of \$5 20, a difference of \$8 80 from Major Wood's statement. "2. Lunch at Toronto station, \$3. This money was taken by the men, on the understanding that it did not come out of their pay, and I cannot understand why it appears in his

statement. to how their money was to be spent in regard to hotel expenses, etc. in this case, no one was consulted sult of the election, which it regards about any expenditure whatever, and I cannot understand why I

"In this instance, Major Wood paid our expenses, as we understood, out of war with Spain is only a step. But his own pocket, and then withheld McKinley will reflect beforehand, be- our pay to reimburse himself, and I maintain that if Major Wood was not willing to pay our expenses, he should have given us our pay and allowed us to settle our own bills; therefore, I think, I am not liable for any bills except camp expenses.
