

UNSETTLED AND RAINY.

CITY AND COUNTY COMING CLOSE

Another Step in the Hospital Negotiations.

Difference Between the Offer and Acceptance Now Slight-Result of an Hour's Caucus and Fifteen Minutes in Council.

As anticipated in The Advertiser yesterday, the city council, at a special meeting in the afternoon, did a great deal towards, completing negotiations with the county council in regard to a joint interest in the Victoria Hospital. The meeting was called for 4 o'clock, but a caucus in the committee room with Auditor Jewell, Treasurer Pope and Warden Elson, lasted an hour, and the business in the council chamber was settled in 15 minutes. The absentees were Ald. Carrothers, McCal-

lum, Gerry and Dreaney.

A motion by Ald. Taylor to reconsider clause four of the proposed agree-

ment passed. A lengthy motion by Ald. Jolly in effect providing that if the cap-italization be \$100,000, instead of \$75,000, as previously proposed, the charge for county patients will be on a basis of actual cost, but if the cost after deducting the government grant be more than 75 cents, the city shall have the option of charging the net 75 cents, or of notifying the county, who may cancel the agree-ment on six months' notice, and if the government grant be withdrawn, the city is to have the same privilege of canceling the agreement, at the ter-mination of which the city is to return the \$15,000. Ald. Winnett seconded. Ald. O'Meara wanted the city solici-tor's opinion as to the legality of the

DR. SEXTON

Sudden Death of a Popular Preacher and Lecturer Well Known in London.

Rev. George Sexton, D.D., LL.D., who has often preached and lectured in this city, dropped dead Tuesday evening from heart disease at the residence of Mr. George Turney, near St. Catharines, which he made his home. Dr. Sexton had just completed a new lecture which he had been working on for some time. Miss Turney was alone in the house with him, and he read it aloud to her while sitting. Before he was quite through reading he got up from his chair and said he felt queer. He walked about the room a little, and complained of a pain about his heart. After requesting a drink of hot peppermint, he expressed a desire to bathe his feet, and as Miss Turney was walking towards the kitchen to get some hot water, he fell dead on the floor. Miss Turney summoned the nearest neighbor, who sent for a doctor, and he pronounced death due to heart disease. Dr. Sexton was born in 1832, and was consequently in his 67th year. He was educated and ordained for the Episcopal ministry, but becoming skeptical in his belief, he left the church, and took up the study of medicine, practicing as a consulting physician in Glasgow, Scotland. After a few years in medicine, he entered the Congregational Church and accepted a pastorate. This, however, was not congenial to him, although he was an elequent and pro-found preacher, and he left the ministry to accept a position as lecturer for the Society for the Suppression of Infidelity. He came to Canada in 1884, and shortly afterwards accepted the pastorate of a Presbyterian church in Dunkirk, in the presbytery of Buffalo. He was of a strong literary turn of mind, and published several books of a controversial nature. He went to St. Catharines about eleven years ago, having retired from the active work of the ministry. He made his home with Mr. George Turney and traveled about delivering lectures, and was a forcible

speaker. Deceased leaves three sons and a daughter. One son is a professor of technics in a college in Glasgow, and another is in the civil service employ in London, England. While he had not acquired any wealth, he realized sufficient from his lectures and sale of his books to meet the ordinary necessities of life.
