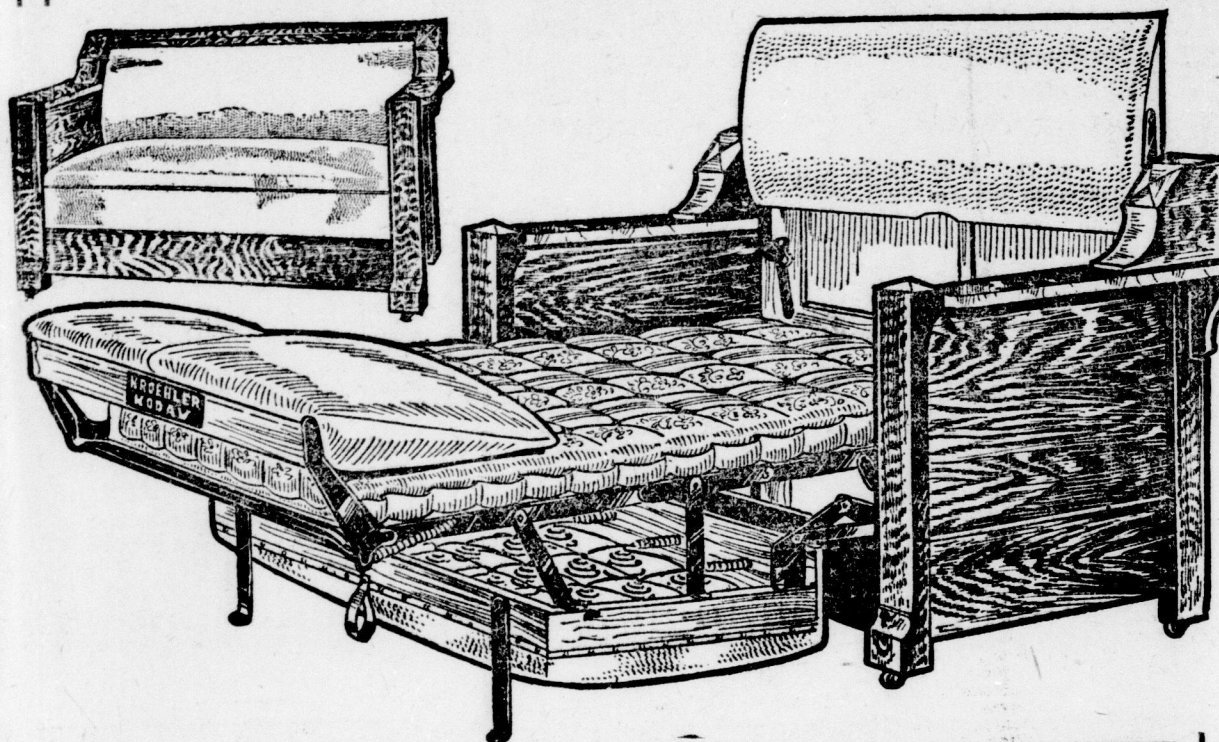

Toronto, March 15.—The evening papers which were deluged by Hiller's appearance on crutches and his foot swathed in bandages into the belief that his ankle was broken were no more surprised than was the rest of the crowd when the little forward dashed on to the ice and played a sparkling game. Hiller did have an injured ankle. It was badly bruised by contact with Stinson's stick in the last ten seconds of the first game. The crutch and bandages were not camouflage. The player was merely taking all possible precautions against further injury and resting his bruised ankle as much as possible.

KITCHENER GOES WILD OVER TEAM'S VICTORY

Kitchener, March 14.—There was the wildest kind of enthusiasm in this city tonight when the result of the final Allan Cup game was received here. The great victory of the Kitchener Cup defenders was greeted with cheers in the theatres and along the streets, and everybody was simply delighted. Preparation for the reception of the world's amateur champions were proceeded with a civic reception will be given the players by the city council on their return to Kitchener, and next Monday evening they will be the guests of honor at a banquet to be tendered by the Kitchener Manufacturers' Association. The capture of the Allan Cup by the O. H. A. champions is the biggest achievement ever accomplished by a sporting club in the history of the city.

The Toronto Mail and Empire says today: "Kitchener showed that as a championship team they are in a class by themselves. They won on merit and nothing else, and there are no alibis that could even be produced. They were beaten at their own game, seven-man hockey. It was a feat worthy of the highest praise and the vast crowd that witnessed every inch of space in the Arena thoroughly appreciated the fact, and cheered the winners to the echo."

Ottawa, March 15.—The proposed post-season series between the Ottawa and Canadian clubs of the N. H. L. has been cancelled.

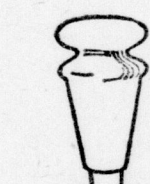
MAY STRIKE BAILEY FROM ARMY STRENGTH SHOULD APPEAL FAIL

Ottawa, March 15.—Any action which may be taken by the militia authorities with regard to Capt. George T. Bailey, who was sentenced to three months on the jail farm by Magistrate Denison of Toronto, as a result of certain references to the conduct of Canadian soldiers which he made in a speech recently, will await the final result of civil proceedings.

At the militia department, it was stated that pending the result of the appeal which is being made by Bailey's counsel to the minister of justice, no action will be taken here. It is understood that if an officer is found guilty and sentenced in a civil court, it is usual to strike him off the strength, and this in all probability will be done should the appeal to the minister of justice fail. Action of this kind would probably be taken by the minister of militia.

Montreal, March 15.—A. A. Mavor, master mechanic at the Grand Trunk shops, Montreal, has retired, at his own request, after a service of 52 years. During the past year 79 Grand Trunk men have been retired from active service.
