



KITCHENER GOES WILD OVER TEAM'S VICTORY

Kitchener, March 14.—There was the wildest kind of enthusiasm in this city tonight when the result of the final Allan Cup game was received here. The great victory of the Kitchener Cup defenders was greeted with cheers in the theatres and along the streets, and everybody was simply delighted. Preparation for the reception of the world's amateur champions were proceeded with. A civic reception will be given the players by the city council on their return to Kitchener, and next Monday evening they will be the guests of honor at a banquet to be tendered by the Kitchener Manufacturers' Association. The capture of the Allan Cup by the O. H. A champions is the biggest achievement ever accomplished by a sporting club in the history of the city.
