BOYS' WORK WILL BE DEVELOPED BY VARIOUS METHODS

Information Gained at Recent Survey Is Now Being Used.

A start in using information gained during the recent survey of boy life here was made when reports of the various committees were made at a supper in the Y. M. C. A. building last night. Rev. W. R. McIntosh, who presided, gave a general outline of the campaign, and urged that card indexes be made of the information that the original cards be placed by congregations and forwarded to them; that cards indicating names of boys who attend neither day or night school be forwarded to the various educational institutions of the city; and that the ministerial alliance be asked to arrange a boys' Sunday to bring the necessity of the work before the people.

J. H. McDermid presented a report on juvenile delinquency. The opinion of the council was that a juvenile court should be in existence in every city of the size of London. Mr. McDermid's report stated that 1,389 boys were brought before the magistrate here during 1916. Of these, 1,000 were sent to the Children's Aid and one to a reformatory. The chief causes of juvenile delinquency were given as home environment, companions, physical and mental defects, and truancy from school. Many of the juvenile cases, the report urged, should be brought to the attention of a competent and sympathetic medical man, who would in many cases be able to remove the cause. Truancy from schools is a very common cause of physical defects which could be remedied. The report urged that a small committee be appointed to work in conjunction with the police.

Mr. Knox presented reports on Sunday schools. Thirty-nine schools reported an enrollment of 1,389 pupils, while the canvass recorded the names of 2,361 boys, indicating, he said, that 97 per cent of the boys canvassed were not attached to any Sunday school. The average regular attendance was 154, approximately 70 per cent of the boys enrolled.

Mr. Knox recommended that every Sunday school be urged to make use of the cards given it by the survey committee, and that efforts be made to organize classes which would attract and hold the boys. Boys' work should be well organized, have a male teacher and a separate room. He urged that the Canadian standard of efficiency be established in every Sunday school.

Industrial Conditions. R. E. G. Davis, secretary of the advisory council, presented a report on the industrial conditions, which urged that a list of boys not attending school be sent to the various industrial night schools of the city, and that arrangements be made to have boys attend classes in the technical school during their working day in cases where the employer had expressed his willingness to sanction such a plan. He recommended also that athletic and social activities be organized for the employed boys.

Mr. Davis also presented a report on playgrounds prepared by E. J. Buchanan. This pointed out that facilities for play are at present confined to the parks and school grounds, which are open only to pupils during school hours. He urged that the city be permitted to use the regular grounds after hours, because of the noise resulting when the boys are not supervised. The public parks, he said, were the logical places in which to provide the necessary equipment, the prime requisites being plenty of space for games such as baseball and football, and simple apparatus. The report stated that the city school board had been approached by the various denominations appointed were Anglican, Rev. A. A. Rice, Rev. Canon Tucker, Rev. H. H. Pope and F. G. Marley; Baptist, Rev. A. C. Bingham, Rev. Mr. McKee, Rev. Mr. Johnson and E. Nolan; Methodist, Rev. H. T. Ferguson, Rev. H. D. Moyer, W. Christie and E. Cowland; Presbyterian, Rev. W. R. McIntosh, Rev. Mr. Harris, Messrs. McArthur and W. D. Beamer; Congregational, Frank Spettigue.

Officers of the committee will be appointed by the representatives when they convene at a later date.

DEPOT BATT. BAND PROMISES TO BE FINE ORGANIZATION

The 1st Depot Battalion, Western Ontario regiment band, is holding rehearsals every day now under the baton of Roselle Pocock, one of London's veteran conductors, and bids fair in time to become one of the crack military bands, not only for the province but of the whole of Canada.

Mr. Pocock was recently called out with his rank of warrant officer to organize this depot band. No men fit for active service are accepted for the band, consequently there are openings for bandmen not physically fit thus to render patriotic service.

CLANDEBYE CITIZEN FINED FOR ASSAULT

EXPERT TELLS WOMEN HOW TO LOOK AFTER GARDENS IN THE FALL

Storing of Winter Vegetables Was Also Discussed at Meeting.

Mr. Allen, a representative of the Ontario Government, spoke at a meeting of the Women's Gardening Association, Thursday afternoon, in Croydon Hall, telling about the care of the soil and storing of winter vegetables. He also gave many useful hints in the planting of gardens, illustrating his address by means of lantern slides.

He emphasized the necessity of digging the soil well and making use of leaves as fertilizer, also mentioning the fact that hoeing should be done constantly and judiciously. Hoeing saves watering because it preserves the moisture, which would otherwise escape through capillary action in the soil. Whale oil soap was advised as a means of preventing grubs in rows of carrot plants, caused by the presence of a young fly. The thinning of plants and tamping of the soil with the foot when planting seeds was also strongly recommended.

"Celery may be kept until Christmas if planted in a box of the same depth as the celery plants, or in a trench, lower at one end, with an outlet for the water to escape in case of heavy rain. As the frost increases, increase the covering over the celery, which may be done by using straw or pine branches," said Mr. Allen.

"Tomatoes may be grown on fences by the single-stem system. Indeed, I strongly recommend it, although I have been criticized for it. Plant them four or five inches apart, and when they are growing nip out the little shoot which appears at the base of every leaf, thus permitting only the central stem to grow. When the plants have reached the height to which you intend them to grow, nip off the top. If you desire to ripen them quickly pinch a little piece off the ends of the leaves and take off all the foliage, leaving only the fruit on the stem. In that case the fruit will wither and not ripen properly. There is nothing so handsome as a fine fence of tomatoes. This year, put in a white tomato plant (Sawball), every sixth plant, and the color scheme was very beautiful, while the white tomatoes are of a much superior flavor. This way of growing tomatoes is advantageous in many ways. It is picturesque, the fruit is cleaner, ripens more quickly, and can be picked more readily. Unfortunately this has not been a good ripening season, but by judicious management tomatoes can be ripened to the point of perfection before the season is over.

"A great many people spoil shrubs by cutting them too severely. Let them grow naturally, merely thinning out where necessary. In connection with perennial borders, Mr. Allen said that labels may be introduced with very good effect. This year Sir Edmund Osler has used a combination of colorful black-leaved beets and sweet alyssum in his borders, and the effect was very beautiful. More than that, the vegetables can be put to good use, now that the season is almost over. The 'Nature's way of protecting plants out-of-doors is the best way, which fact I have expounded out at all times, few leaves with small sticks to hold them in place."
