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PLOT DISCOVERED TO OVERTHROW GERMAN GOVERNMENT STRONG OPPOSITION IN SENATE TO GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY BILL

WOULD HAVE DRURY IN CABINET POSITIONS OPEN, BUT LET LABOR SELECT THE MEN

Suggestion Comes From Labor Members Elect in Niagara Peninsula Ridings—McBride's Departure From Conference Does Not Affect His Standing in I. L. P.

St. Catharines, Nov. 6.—A suggestion that Premier-designate E. C. Drury name the two cabinet positions to be filled by labor members and permit the labor men to select the personnel is contained in a statement signed by Frank Greenlaw, and C. F. Swasey, labor members-elect for the border ridings of St. Catharines and Niagara Falls, after a conference last night in this city. "We quite understand the reason for Mr. McBride's departure from the joint conference in Toronto," said the statement of the two members submitted to the press this morning, "that he left when Mr. Drury stated that he must have the final say in the selection of his cabinet ministers."

"Mr. McBride's departure does not in any way affect his standing with the I. L. P. and in our opinion if Mr. Drury insists upon having any labor cabinet representatives he should name both of and of course any choice he might make would have to be approved by the elected members and the provincial executive of the Independent Labor Party."

"This, we believed, would be the only procedure giving a basis of true co-operation."

"We are of the opinion," the statement concludes, "that it would simply matter of time before things out if Mr. Drury would name the two cabinet positions to be filled by labor members and let labor men make their own choice."

Debate Resumed on Report of Special Committee on Soldiers' Re-education

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—Shortly after the House met this morning, Hon. C. C. Balfour, minister of marine and fisheries, who has not been present during the session owing to serious illness, entered the Chamber. He was received with applause by both sides of the House.

Dr. D. McKenna asked whether the minister of marine and fisheries would give the House any assurance that the new Parliament Buildings would be ready for occupation by the end of the session.

Hon. A. L. Sifton regretted that he could make no positive statement. In answer to a question by Dr. E. J. Mackenzie, Dr. McKenna stated that there are sufficient raw materials on hand, and that he is endeavoring to secure the necessary quantities of the material required for the construction of the new Parliament Buildings.

Resuming the debate on the report of the special committee on the soldiers' re-education, Dr. J. W. Edwards, Frontenac, devoted a large part of his opening remarks to a criticism of the report.

Dr. Edwards declared that while he himself had no personal knowledge of the report, he had no doubts as to its accuracy. He said that the report was a masterpiece of misrepresentation.

He charged Col. Currie with having made unwarranted statements regarding the members of the committee, and with having made a statement that he was not present at the meeting of the committee.

Chicago Averages A Murder a Day

Chicago, Nov. 6.—In addressing the Chicago Association of Commerce yesterday, Edwin W. Sims, president of the Chicago crime commission and former I. L. P. district attorney, declared that Chicago, with its population of 2,500,000, has more murders in a year than England, Scotland and Wales with their 49,000,000 people. He said last year the murders in Chicago averaged one a day.

"Crime in this city is as highly organized as small-order business," said Mr. Sims. "There is not a police captain in the city who is not bribed by the prosecuting authorities and the courts, cannot reduce crime in the least degree, and in 30 days if he wants to. Crime conditions in Chicago are appalling."

BOLSHEVIKI REPORT CAPTURE OF ISHIM

Russian Reds Claim 1,200 Prisoners Were Taken At Same Time.

London, Nov. 6.—A Russian Bolshevik communication received here reports the capture of Ishim, 75 miles north of Petrograd, with 1,200 prisoners. The communists also claim the capture of 1,000 prisoners at Ustuzhsk.

80,000 MEN RAISED IN PETROGRAD TO HELP DEFEND CITY.

Copenhagen, Nov. 6.—The Bolsheviks are reported to have recruited a force of 80,000 men from Petrograd alone in organizing the defence of that city, according to a Revel dispatch to the National Tidende. The troops include Russians (from the Indian frontier) and Chinese, the latter being men who had received training in China under retired officers from European armies.

GERMANY'S ONLY HOPE TO WIN WAS THROUGH DIPLOMATIC CHANNELS

Official Archives of German Government Disclose Astonishing Revelations.

Berlin, Nov. 6.—The official archives as disclosed at yesterday's session of the sub-committee of the assembly investigating the war, brought out the astonishing revelation that the army authorities in this went on record as declaring that land warfare could not win the war for Germany; that it must be won diplomatically and politically.

Parisian Cafes Must Close At Midnight To Conserve Coal Supply

Paris, Nov. 6.—In order to reduce the consumption of coal the prefect of the Seine has ordered cafes to close at midnight, instead of at 1 o'clock, and a delegation from the general federation of labor, which called at the ministry of reconstruction to inquire what measures were being taken by the Government to avoid closing factories because of the lack of coal, was told the coal shortage in Paris district would be ameliorated after November 15.

CALLS FOR A REFERENDUM.

Melbourne, Australia, Nov. 6.—Frank G. Tudor, leader of the Labor party, opening the labor campaign against fortunes made through the war, monopoly and large estates, said the heavy war tax could be reduced by land and capital levies. He called for a referendum to amend the constitution.

SUPREME COUNCIL TO RECEIVE DELEGATION OF GERMANS ON NOV. 10

Paris, Nov. 6.—The supreme council today discussed plans for receiving a German delegation on November 10 to sign the protocol guaranteeing the carrying out by Germany of portions of the armistice conditions which she has so far failed to meet. It is assumed that Baron von Lersner, head of the mission at Versailles, will sign the protocol for Germany.

COMMUNISTS OF GERMANY PLAN TO OVERTHROW GOVERNMENT AND ESTABLISH BOLSHEVIK SYSTEM

Campaign For Proposed Revolution Is Being Conducted by Russian Bolsheviks—Radicals At Head of Movement Count On Wholesale Desertions From National Defence Army—General Strike To Be Called In All Industries.

Essen, Germany, Oct. 15.—Investigations for the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin, claim to have discovered plans for a communist uprising to depose the present German Government and to establish a new one modelled on the Russian Bolshevik system. The plan is to be carried out by the use of force, and is being conducted by the Russian Bolsheviks, who are being assisted and aided by German radicals.

LONDON'S LAST MILLION BOOST PUTS ONTARIO OVER THE TOP

This Province Is First to Attain Objective in Special Subscriptions.

TOTAL IS \$232,504,527

Four Ontario Cities Have Passed \$4,000,000 Mark, 8 Beyond Million.

Toronto, Nov. 6.—The total amount subscribed to the Victory Loan, according to returns up to noon today, is now \$232,504,527, divided into provinces as follows:

These totals represent reports up to Tuesday night from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Montreal, Quebec, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, up to Monday night from Nova Scotia, and up to last night from Ontario.

Up to Tuesday night, the following totals had been reached by various cities:

Victoria, \$2,270,100; Vancouver, \$1,570,850; New Westminster, \$507,577; Edmonton, \$1,043,150; Calgary, \$2,653,850; Lethbridge, \$300,666; Medicine Hat, \$365,000; Charlottetown, \$188,000.

London at noon today put Ontario over the top in special subscriptions to the Victory Loan. Ontario is the first province in Canada to reach its special subscription objective.

The application that turned the trick was \$1,000,000 from the London Life Insurance Company. Telephone calls to J. H. Gandy, chairman of the Dominion special subscriptions committee, which handles all amounts of \$25,000 and more, incidentally London advanced itself today to 150 per cent of its \$1,000,000 objective, exceeding the goal by \$500,000.

Four Ontario cities had passed the \$4,000,000 mark in the special subscription to the Victory Loan campaign, while eight cities had passed the million dollar mark. St. Catharines, Sault Ste. Marie, and Windsor, were the only cities to have passed the million dollar mark.

URGES THAT SPAIN "ALLY HERSELF WITH BIG WORLD POWERS"

Former Premier Declares Such Action Would Keep Country Out of War.

Madrid, Nov. 6.—Alliances by Spain with friendly powers to insure the maintenance of peace were urged by Premier Romanones, in a speech at a banquet here last evening.

"I know," the former premier said, "but it is an hour for alliances contracted by the force of public opinion, and in common accord with the Government and the King. Treaties of alliance with France, Great Britain and the United States would be the surest guarantee we could have to keep out of war."

SENATOR M'LENNAN, A UNION GOVT. SUPPORTER, URGES THAT PEOPLE DECIDE G. T. R. ISSUE

Opposes Buying of Railway Because He Believes Nothing Has Happened to Justify Such Action by Govt.—Challenges Administration to Take Question to Electors

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—Opposition in the Senate to the Grand Trunk bill continues to develop. So far it has been largely confined to the Government's own supporters, the opposition so far, with the exception of Senator Lynch-Staunton, has been in the Senate to the Government have attacked the Government's bill with an intensity not surpassed by the Opposition in the Lower House. They are Senators Foster, McLennan, Nicholls, Ross, Gordon and White. Others who are said to be opposed to the bill include Senators Lynch-Staunton, Thomas, Bradbury, Fowler and Beaulieu. This makes eleven Government members in all.

As a matter of fact the speech of Senator Ross, who is a very close adviser of Sir James Loughheed, leader of the Senate, has had the effect of adding to the direct opponents of the measure and of instilling in the minds of others a doubt which was not there before. It is realized fully that the bill will have a hard time passing the Senate and that if it does it will be with the narrowest majority ever accorded to any measure in parliament.

WAR BETWEEN TURK FACTIONS IS PREDICTED

Hostilities Likely to Occur as Result of Nationalists' Attitude.

OUTLOOK IS GLOOMY

Many Desertions Reported From Ranks of Mussulman Forces.

Paris, Nov. 6.—The possibility of hostilities between the Turkish Government and the Nationalist forces headed by Mustafa Kemal Pasha, is held out in a dispatch received here from Athens.

"It appears from information gathered in well-informed circles," says the message, "that Mustafa Kemal Pasha's unyielding attitude will place the Constantinople Government in such a position that it will have to change its hostilities against the Nationalists. The outlook is considered gloomy."

EX-KAISER LOSES HIS DOCTOR; PAY PROVES TOO SMALL

Amerongen, Holland, Oct. 20.—The suite of the former German emperor at Amerongen has been reduced by five persons as a result of the departure recently for Berlin of his private physician, Dr. Forstner, an old family doctor who had been at Amerongen many months. It is the gossip of the village that Dr. Forstner found it impossible to support his family on the meagre salary of a German doctor, and that he has returned to general practice in Berlin. A military aide, Dr. von der Goltz, has taken his place.

REPUBLICAN ELECTED KENTUCKY GOVERNOR BY LARGE MARGIN

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 6.—On the face of unofficial returns from all but one of the 120 counties, the Republican, James H. Ray, has won the gubernatorial election in Kentucky by a large margin. The vote was 56,000 for Ray and 40,000 for the Democratic candidate, James H. Ray. The vote was very close in some of the counties, but Ray won by a large margin in the majority of the counties.

GOVERNMENT PLANS TO CONSTRUCT 50 WOODEN SCHOONERS IN B. C.
