Decision To Supplant Capt. FOUR TIGER BOXMEN William Burton in Cup Race -Designer Nicholson or Capt. Neill Are Likely Choices For Tuesday's Race.

SANDY HOOK, July 18 .- Sir Thomas Lipton plans to take Captain William Burton from the wheel of the cup hallenger, Shamrock IV. The decision to supplant Captain Bur-

on as skipper of the Lipton sloop was practically reached at a series of conerence today of Sir Thomas Lipton, Captain H. L. Garrett, representative of the Royal Ulster Yacht Club on board the Resolute; Charles Nicholson, designer of the Shamrock, and Col. Duncan signer of the Shannock, and col. Buncan F. Neill, personal representative of Sir Thomas on board the Shannock. When the Lipton 70-footer is found at the starting line for Tuesday's race, either Col. Neill ro Designer Nicholson

will probably be in command.
