Fat cattle are very scarce, and stockers are harder to procure than in former years, wille local butchers find it difficult to procure suitable animals. As a consequence, a good deal of inferior beef has been disposed of at good prices. Sheep are doing well, lambs coming strong and plentiful in proportion to the number of dams. High prices for these also prevall. A correspondent very suggestively remarks that the rables among dogs has been a boon to sheep. Swine are not so plentiful as in former years, as they have been rushed to market at prices characterized by one correspondents.
