**BURY THE HATCHET.**  
MONTREAL, Nov. 20.—The Montreal Star to-day publishes the first interview with Col. Hanbury Williams about his intentions in regard to the Olympic games, and his views on the disgraceful athletic fight that is reading Canada's athletes. He insists that if Canada wants to make a showing at all, the Canadian Union and the Canadian Federation must come together, bury the hatchet and be of united purpose, and that at once stop washing their dirty linen before the world. He intends to bring them together, as he thinks that is the only way in which we can make a showing in London next year, and the only salvation for Canadian athletics in the future. He says that he should be taken of what the American Athletic Union says. "We are working for Canada, not for the United States. This looking after the interests of Canada as a whole is what we are after. We are not interested in any other country. Other countries can look after themselves." He insists that private differences must be buried for the sake of national glory.
