CANADIAN SINGER DIES IN MONTREAL

Mrs. Emmeline De Lamothe Christian Studied Under Saint Saens

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—Mrs. Emmeline De Lamothe Christian, well-known Canadian singer and former "court singer" at Government House, Ottawa, is dead at St. Mary's Hospital after a short illness. She was in her 69th year. Born and educated in Montreal, she began studying music at an early age. After leaving the Sacred Heart convent here, she went to Paris, and for a time worked under Saint Saens. Later she made tours of Canada and the United States. She spent 15 years in British Columbia, but came to reside in Montreal five years ago. She is survived by two sons and three daughters.
