



Toronto University Professor Offers Publicity Suggestions.

Professor C. R. Fay, M.A., D. Sc., of Professor C. R. Fay, M.A., D. Sc., of the University of Toronto, is staying at the Royal Hotel. He arrived here on Saturday and will leave on Wednesday for Prince Edward Island, where he hopes to see the fox farms and to learn the methods used in raising these animals. Professor Fay is spending a month in the Maritime Provinces studying the economic side of settlement here.

Professor Fay was formerly on the faculty of Cambridge University, England, but has been occupying the seat of economic history at Toronto University for the last three years.

He made a prolonged tour of western Canada in 1922, studiying the economics of land settlement there and the question of co-operative organization for the marketing of commodities by the farmers. He wrote articles on these subjects for the people of Europe.

He is now making a similar study tour of the Maritimes and has already made considerable progress. The prices of farms here were low compared with those in Ontario and the west, he said It was a question whether the farmer would not be benefited bya co-operative marketing system similar to those in effect in Denmark, California, Britist Columbia and other places to widen the markets for their produce.
