## N. B. CHAPLAIN IS WAR STORY AUTHOR

Rev. J. B. Murdoch Produces Work Rich in Human Interest.

Rev. Father Murdoch, of Douglstown, N. B., went overseas from Valcartier at the beginning of the war as one of the Roman Catholic chaplains with the Canadian forces. He remained there until after the Armistice, and took part in the advance into conquered Germany. This book contains his impressions. It is a personal document, and only in the most incidental manner a history of the military events that were taking place around him. It follows him from training camp to train-

ing camp; see him putting together so lovingly the little collapsible altar which is to serve its purpose in so many rough places; note how he gets many of his men to sign the pledge to leave strong drink alone while on active service—except army issues of rum, etc.—and watch him typing their names on silk, and lining his altar with it. We see him in the hospitals giving comfort and absolution to the dying, and messages of cheer to the recuperating. We see him in the front line trenches, in the rest camps, creeping through a barrage in a word, everywhere the Canadian fighting man went, there was Father Murdoch.

Simple and sincere.

His narrative has interest and literary merit because it is a document, a record of what he saw and did. "When I came back all the men were sleeping. I then lay down in the ditch, put my head on the ground, and although it was the 28th of March I was soon sound asleep. In about two hours we were awakened (p. 108). I have searched the entire book in vain for any hint that the Padre was conscious of hardship or privation, or thought himself a hero. He agrees with General Sherman, but only because of the waste of the war, and the cruelty of war, not because he has any complaints to make on his own account.

No, he is upborne by his zeal for his appointed work. "Often, I had the great joy of seeing men, a long way from the sacraments, return to God" (p. 78). And again: "My Christmas dinner was a piece of dry roast beef, almost burnt, some potatoes, bread and margarine, with a little apricot jam and a cup of tea; that was all. Yet I think it was the happiest Christmas I ever spent, for, as I thought of the first wonderful meeting with those Canadian Catholic soldiers on the Western Front, I felt that in their midst those words, written so long ago, 'There was no room in the Inn,' could not be said that Christmas Day" (p. 122). It is touching, too, to note the simplicity of his confession about that last Christmas—the one on which he was to give Communion for the last time to the men—his men. The army is on German soil now. It is Christmas Day, 1918. The service is to take place in a German church. Just as the service is about to begin, the German priest steps up and tells Father Murdoch that he has been elected to the Communion, as he himself, the German, will deliver the sacrament. A pang shot through the Canadian's human breast—he had counted on this fitting farewell—but anxious to comply the spirit of Jesus at His Christmas Day, he stepped back, and that last Midnight Mass at Altenbrück was said by the German priest. Most important thing.

I might have emphasized chapter sixty-seven, "The Workers," where the peasants of France are described so graphically or passages telling about the monasteries the author visited in England and France; but, despite their literary merit, I have elected in the short space at my disposal to touch on the most important thing about the book, and that is the quiet nobility and single-mindedness of Father Murdoch, which, quite unconsciously and naturally, shines out from the pages of this intimate and exceedingly well written and interesting narrative.
