TURKS DO NOT FAVOR BOXING

Natives Not Impressed by
Tourney—Only Small
Crowd Attends.

Although Turkey has taken up boxing and many other Western sports and is making great progress in them, boxing is still a foreign branch of athletics to the Turk, as a recent amateur and professional tourney in Constantinople demonstrated. Previous attempts had been made in that city to place boxing before the public, but the crowds attracted were very small. It was thought by the promoters that the mediocrity of the boxers was responsible, so for the last encounter representatives of Italy and Germany and France were engaged.

In spite of the fact that the bouts were hotly contested from start to finish and two knockouts featured the bill, the small crowd which attended failed to show any enthusiasm, and, according to one critic, "as though dazed." A young Turk was introduced in the ring and after a few fast sessions with a German amateur retired. The Turk would give no reason for leaving the ring. The only statement he made was that he never knew it again.

Kid Jack, who stated that he was an American, met Domenico of Italy in one of the bouts, but he was unable to leave his corner at the start of the sixth round. At the conclusion of the fight the promoters announced that they would make another attempt at holding a series of bouts, but that if it failed they would retire permanently.

FRANCE PLANS A FOREIGN EXCHANGE CLEARING HOUSE

Paris, Jan. 22.—The ministry of finance is working on plans for the creation of a foreign exchange clearing house, according to the newspaper L'Ouvrier.

The object, the newspaper says, is to guarantee the French manufacturers and traders doing business abroad the greatest stability and security by enabling them to obtain whatever foreign currency they need at prices that will not be affected by speculation.

Chicago, Jan. 21.—Young Jake Scherer, son of the famous wizard, defeated Champ Willie Hoppe, 500 to 869 tonight in the first block of their 1,500 point match for the world's 16.2 ball line billiard championship.

WOULD DEMPSEY HAVE A CHANCE?

Comparison Between Gorilla
and the World's Heavy-
weight Champion.

Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 22.—(United Press.)—Back from the Belgian Congo, after a hunting trip of three years' duration, Capt. Ben. Burbridge, famous big game hunter, is ready to ship the skeleton and hide of a 560 pound male gorilla to the Smithsonian Institute in Washington. The monster would make in life, according to Capt. Burbridge, a play thing out of a dozen Dempseys.

Six large elephants, several lions, zebras and other animals were captured during the trip.

Presented to the national Belgian museum in Antwerp was a 40 pound baby male gorilla, the only one in captivity. Three other babies, taken alive by Captain Burbridge, died en route to Europe. Influenza accounted for their deaths, Capt. Burbridge said.

Here is a comparison of the measurements of the large gorilla killed by Capt. Burbridge with those of Jack Dempsey, world's champion heavyweight prizefighter:

Although the animal was about 40 years of age when killed, Burbridge showed newspaper men the excellent condition of the hide, the tremendous muscular development which caused the spine to arch forward and the powerful tearing teeth, two of which had been broken in combat.

The roar of the gorilla, said Burbridge, is more terrifying than that of either lion or tiger, and its charge is tremendous. The gorilla, in making his way through the jungle, tears down and snaps with ease bamboo trees two or three inches in diameter and it the sound of snapping trees which shows the hunter that he is near gorillas.

In capturing one of the baby gorillas, Capt. Burbridge and a native had a battle in which the clothes were torn from the hunters' bodies by the gorilla, which weighed only forty pounds.


