INTRODUCING REINDER

Sir R. M. Kindersley, Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, in his address at the annual meeting, said: "Over two years ago your company were approached by Mr. Stefenson, the well-known explorer, with a view to introducing reindeer into Baffin Land. A separate company was formed, in which your company hold the greater part of the capital, and a lease of the southern half of Baffin Land was secured from the Dominion government for a term of fifteen years, after which there is to be an annual rent of \$11,280, and 550 reindeer, accompanied by a number of men, and their families and paraphernalia, were successfully transported in one of your company's steamers from Norway to Baffin Land last autumn."

"In deciding to carry out the expedition, your company were actuated by the knowledge that the project had the active support of the government of Canada, and we also felt it desirable that, if the work was to be undertaken, it should be done by a company, who possessed a thorough knowledge of the natives in that region, rather than by some corporation who had no such knowledge, and who might conceivably interfere unnecessarily with the hunters of fur-bearing animals."

"Furthermore, we carefully investigated the results of the reindeer ranches in Alaska, where 2,000 reindeer were originally introduced, which have since increased to well over 200,000. We understand that the natural increase should be over 30 per cent. per annum. "It must be recognized, of course, that the project is entirely in the nature of an experiment, the success of which is largely dependent upon climatic conditions, but one which it was evidently desirable should be made in the interests of Canada."

NEW CLUB FOR CANADIANS

A few of the aims and objects are: Business building, civic development, true Canadianism, the enforcement of laws and better government, and legislature. A magazine will be published monthly.
