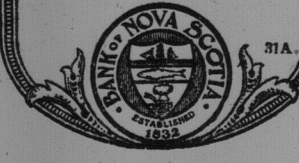

TRAIN SCHEDULE ON THE VALLEY RAILWAY

Through Express Trains Between Centreville and St. John at the Start

(Frederick Gleaner)

Running rights whereby the Canadian National Railways can run trains from the St. John Valley Railway over the C. P. R. tracks into St. John, have been arranged, according to an announcement made today by Hon. W. P. Jones, president of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, who has returned to Woodstock from Toronto, where he was conferring with C. N. R. officials relative to the St. John Valley Railway being taken over by the C. N. R.

Hon. Mr. Jones said that he had conferred with President Hanna and General Traffic Manager A. A. Hayes and that they had agreed that the operation of the St. John Valley Railway through to St. John would be commenced July 1st, 1920, the certificate of completion of the railway for operation is given by Chief Engineer Brown of Montreal. Mr. Jones said that other officials of the C. N. R. are due to make an inspection trip over the road tomorrow.

Present arrangements for operation of the Valley Railway call for a through express train service between Centreville and St. John leaving Centreville at 6.45 a. m. and St. John about 2 or 3 p. m. Attached to the train when it leaves St. John will be a through sleeping car for Montreal, which will be transferred here to the Canadian Eastern division train and at McGowen Junction to the Transcontinental route for Montreal. The through train for St. John and Centreville would thus arrive here from Centreville about 10.30 a. m. and St. John about 6 p. m.

QUEBEC MINING INDUSTRY

The "Report on Mining Operations in the Province of Quebec during the year 1918" has just been published by the Quebec bureau of mines, under the authority of the Hon. H. McCreary, Minister of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries.

The statistics collected by the bureau show that the mineral production of the province during the year 1918 was the highest ever recorded as to value. It amounted to \$18,707,762, an increase of 16 per cent as compared with 1917. The growth of the industry is indicated by the fact that in 1900 the production was two and one-half million dollars and in 1910 it was seven and one-quarter millions. The table shows that the province produces asbestos, chrome, copper, gold, graphite, magnesite, mica, molybdenum, zinc, lead, and all kinds of building materials.

The great activity in mining in 1918 was to a great extent due to the war needs, and the armistice was followed by a period of quietness. It is possible that the year 1919 may for some time remain the banner year as to mineral production.

Under the title of "Mining Ventures and the Public" the report contains a very timely chapter, warning the public against the reappearance of the professional promoter of shady mining enterprises, selling beautifully engraved certificates for which he is quite willing to take "Victory Bonds." The last three years have been prosperous and a great deal of savings has been accumulated, making ideal conditions for unscrupulous promoters of all kinds of get-rich-quick schemes.

Brandon Man, July 29.—Reports of rust and samples of rusted wheat are shaking the confidence of the wheat farmers in the Brandon district in their belief that the wheat average in this district will be between eighteen and twenty bushels an acre. Individual fields in all points of the compass, with Brandon as the hub, show damage from rust in some instances cutting the yield estimate for the fields affected to twenty-five bushels an acre to chicken feed only. This refers particularly to late wheat.
