COUNTY COURT.
Daniel Mullin, K. C., moved in the county court this morning before Judge Armstrong on behalf of Max Webber, who was acquitted by a jury on Friday, to have the goods which were found in his possession when arrested restored to him. The motion was granted and an order made to restore the goods to Webber.

THE ROYAL FLYING CORPS
After today members of the defunct Royal Flying Corps will automatically be transferred to the Royal Air Force. Up to today men have had the privilege of applying for their discharge. Quitting the Royal Flying Corps does not mean their absolute freedom from military service, as they are all subject to the workings of the Military Act. It is understood that 2,500 N. C. O.'s and men of the Royal Flying Corps are eligible for discharge.

NUTS SCARCE

Order-in-Council Limits Further Importation

Local wholesalers report that there are only moderate supplies of shelled and unshelled nuts on hand, and that these will be speedily reduced. An order-in-council has been passed limiting further importations to those brought in under license. All lines of nuts have experienced an advance as a result of the scarcity. At this season of the year the demand is even greater than at Christmas times, nuts being used so largely in ice creams and in salads. There may be a further advance in prices in which nuts are used.

In the list of goods, the import of which is prohibited, the burden falls most heavily on the fruit and grocery business. The list under restriction, so far as it directly concerns the grocery business, includes: Blackberries, gooseberries, raspberries, currants and grapes. In green fruits: Peaches, plums, quinces, apricots, pears and nectarines. Further mention is made of mangoes, plantains, pomegranates and pineapples. Nuts include almonds, shelled and unshelled, unshelled Brazil nuts, shelled and unshelled pecans, shelled peanuts, unshelled walnuts and other unshelled nuts, fruit juices, peels and extracts.

THEFT CHARGES IN THE POLICE COURT

Evidence was taken this morning in the case against Privates George Abbott of the United States and James Whalley, held in custody on suspicion of stealing a telephone and cash receiving box from a booth in George A. Cameron's drug store in Charlotte street on Friday, May 24. L. W. Morse of the N. B. Telephone Company testified that he could identify the telephone and cash box produced in court as the property of the company and also as the one which was located at Mr. Cameron's drug store. He said it was valued at \$22.55. John Bond testified that he found the telephone and cash box between two cars in Water street on the evening of May 24. He notified the detectives and they took possession of the goods. He also told about seeing two soldiers hurry past him about 10.20 o'clock on the same night. One was short and the other was quite tall. Detective Donahue testified about receiving the box and subsequently assisting in arresting the two defendants.

In the police court this morning Edward Harrison, a young soldier, appeared to answer a charge of acting together with Joseph Cochran, and entering the grocery store of Mrs. Sadie King, 42 Brook street on June 7 and stealing \$13 from the cash till, and also for breaking and entering the dwelling house of Thomas Martin of Chapel Grove and stealing a revolver and some cartridges. No evidence was taken this morning.

GERMAN WORKERS MAKE DEMANDS FOR MORE PAY

SOMETHING THAT SHOULD BE TAKEN UP IN ST. JOHN

A Lesson From Saturday's Track Meet Under Auspices of the Intercollegiate League

To the Editor of The Times:
Sir:—The track meet held on Saturday under the auspices of the Intercollegiate League, the competitors in which were St. John High School and Rotherham Collegiate School, seems to emphasize a point which should be brought before the citizens of St. John, viz., the lack of any athletic association with proper grounds for the use of its members. There is probably no other city in Canada, or elsewhere, of the size of St. John where there are no suitable grounds of some sort which can be used for the development of our boys in wholesome outdoor athletics. On the theory of "A sound mind in a sound body," the truth of which cannot be denied, St. John is doing very little towards the development of its boys along these lines. Outside of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. M. C. L., which offer practically only indoor facilities, the boys of St. John have no outlet for their energies, and in consequence, the school rooms, the movies and the cigarette stores get more patronage than is probably advisable or healthful.

Are there not enough good citizens in St. John, interested in outdoor athletics, such as track sports and football, to see that an athletic association is started and suitable grounds provided? There are numbers of men in the city who have excelled in sport in their day who should take up this question and get together and endeavor to see this thing through. Surely the present war emphasizes the necessity for the best development of our boys—the men of tomorrow who, if that athletic association is started and put in a year or two. The lack of facilities for practising and undergoing a proper course of training were painfully apparent in Saturday's track meet. The High School boys were outclassed, not because the material was wanting, but simply because they lacked training and practice. The Rotherham team which, except in one or two instances, showed no marked excellence, were, on the contrary, thoroughly trained and gave evidence of skill in perfect physical condition. This in itself shows the value of outdoor athletics, and the self-control which they entail if success is to be attained. The High School team, under similar training conditions, would have been a different lot of boys physically and would undoubtedly have made the results of the meet very different. Are there any sportsmen in St. John who are not of their own interested enough to take this matter up?

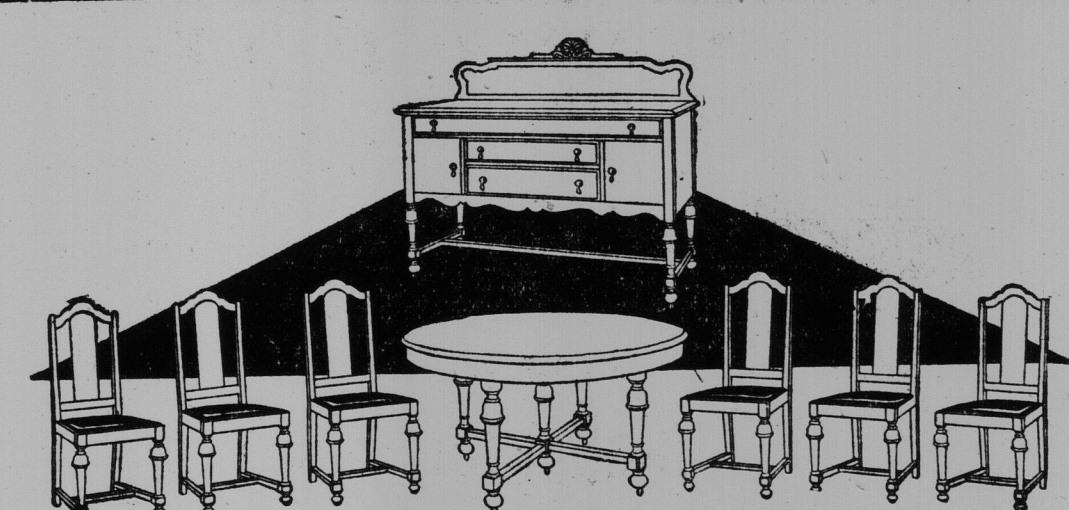
