Under No Circumstances Will Fight The Mexican People

MERELY A MATTER WITH HUERTA

Wilson Makes Statement in Position Following Refusal of Mexican Dictator to Salute Flag---Both Houses of Congress to Meet This Afternoon

(Canadian Press.) Washington, April 20-President Wilson told the Washington correspondents today not to get the impression that the United States was going to have war with Mexico. He pointed out that under o circumstances would the United States fight the Mexican people; that it was their friend.

Mr. Wilson said he was going to congress, to tell of a special situation. He declared the issue was only one between the United States and a man who calls himself president of Mexico but whom the United States had never recognized as entitled to that right.

The president said the intention of the United States was to help the people of Mexico and that he had gotten a feeling of uneasiness when he found the wspapers filled with enthusiasm for

Mr. Wilson declared he did not want war, and that he did not consider such reprisals as are planned acts of war, but measures short of war sustained by the Graytown precedent, for one.

He said that in reality he was going

to congress on an occasion for which, strictly speaking, it was not necessary to obtain authority, but that it was his desire to have the full co-operation and thought and purpose of congress.
