UNDERGROUND HANGARS. Amsterdam, Jan. 31.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press).—The German army is now constructing underground hangars for its airplanes as protection against English bombing raids, says the Echo Belge. At one of the principal Belgian aerodromes, hangars of this type capable of housing twelve machines have already been completed by the use of war-prisoner labor. The hangars are of great depth and are protected overhead by a thick roof of concrete and earth. The machines are underground and emerge by a long runway in full sight. In returning they alight on the inclined plane, down which the machines run easily to their shelters.

ACADEMY FOR WOMEN. Paris, Feb. 28.—An "academy" for women on the lines of the French Academy is to be founded, it is announced. It will be limited to ten members, the first list being composed entirely of well-known women writers. Attached to the Academy will be an Institute of Fine Arts, composed of women artists, sculptors, decorators and modelers. The president of the Institute will be a dressmaker.

NO MORE BULBS. Leyden, Netherlands, Feb. 28.—No longer will the famous road to Haarlem present an uninterrupted vista of flowering bulbs, when spring comes. The bulb business, which has been seriously hit by the war, offers such poor prospects that many growers have partly abandoned bulb planting and have taken to vegetable raising instead. Extensive vegetable drying sheds have been erected along the canals where in previous years banks of multi-colored tulips and hyacinths delighted the eye. To-day, the facilities for drying vegetables, especially cabbages and carrots, are limited to about 600 tons a week.

FRENCH PRIZES FOR LITERATURE AND VIRTUE. Paris, Feb. 28.—One of the functions of the French Academy—more accurately the Academy of Language and Literature—is its right to award a large number of money prizes for literary merit and for "virtue." Since 1914 all the literary prizes have been reserved to men serving with the colors. The "virtue" prizes are awarded to humble people "who have lived pure and useful lives," sacrificing the pursuit of all selfish aims to the service of their families or their country.

STORM OR HUNS? London, Feb. 28.—The British courts will be asked to decide whether the famous Polar exploration ship Aurora, wreckage of which was found near the Australian coast, was lost through storm or by German action. If the former, the marine insurance people will have to pay; if the latter, the loss will fall on the government war insurance.

First Woman Embroiderer. Amsterdam, Feb. 28.—Women bank clerks virtually have replaced men in Germany from the early days of the war, but the first case of an embossing woman bank clerk has just occurred in Berlin. The accused girl, Rose Neumann, was convicted of stealing \$6,000 in Russian securities from the Dresdner Bank and was sentenced to eight months' imprisonment. She stated during the trial that she had spent all the proceeds on food and theatre tickets.

THE ENEMY BANKS. London, Feb. 28.—It is impossible to liquidate the affairs of the London branches of enemy banks during the war, says Sir William Pender, if this includes collection of all other than enemy assets and repayment of advances made by the Bank of England. This indebtedness amounted, Sir William reported, to \$410,000; cash payments of \$1,078,372 having been made during the last year.
