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de FOREST CASE GOES OVER TO OCTOBER 4

Harry W. de Forest the Only Witness Heard At This Morning's Session of the Chancery Division

The case of Tilley, assignee of the Harry deForest, Limited, vs Harry W. deForest and J. Harvey Brown was resumed this morning before Chief Justice Baker in the Chancery Division at half past ten o'clock. Shortly before twelve o'clock the defendant closed his case and October 4 at 11 a. m. was set for argument of counsel.

M. G. Teed, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff, D. Mullin K. C., for the defendant, deForest, and A. A. Wilson, K. C., for the defendant, Brown.

The defendant Harry W. deForest was the first and only witness this morning. Examined by Mr. Mullin the witness said that the Boston branch of the business was in a flourishing condition. When he arrived in St. John from Boston just prior to the winding up of the company a detailed statement of the assets and liabilities of the company was prepared by Auditor Corbett. This statement was received in evidence. Witness said that L. P. D. Tilley suggested that the company go into liquidation. Mr. deForest said that the high quality of Union Brand Tea was due to his personal skill and attention. He also claimed that the trademark covering this brand was his personal trade mark. Witness said that when the company took over the tea business conducted by him absolutely nothing was said about the trademark.

Mr. Mullin then took up the question of the counterclaim. Mr. Teed objected on the ground that as this was a suit for specific performance the matter of the counterclaim was not involved. His Honor took the same view but permitted Mr. Mullin to go into the matter. Witness then explained about an item of over \$600.

Mr. Wilson objected on the ground that the matter of the counterclaim was not involved.

His Honor took the same view and Mr. Mullin withdrew the counterclaim.

Cross-examined by Mr. Teed, witness admitted that he treated the mark as the property of the company. He said he did not for a moment take the use of the trade mark away from the company.

This closed the case.

Adjournment was made until October 4 at 11 a. m. when argument of counsel will be presented.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. deForest, Chas. Howell and Noel F. Sheraton were examined.

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
