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YESTERDAY IN PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, June 8.—In the House of Commons yesterday the third reading was given the bill amending the civil service act. A bill to regulate the inspection and sale of commercial feeding stuffs was given first reading. A bill respecting the director of coal operations for district 18 was given its second reading and progress reported on it. The second reading was given a bill amending the customs tariff of 1907, which was reported from committee. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police estimates and soldiers land settlement estimates were adopted. Sir Henry Drayton announced that next session of parliament would be held in January.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King asked when a writ would be issued for a by-election in East Elgin. Sir Robert Borden replied that he would make enquiries into the circumstances. He understood that a limit was fixed by statute.

Colonel J. A. Currie of Simcoe North protested against the system of nominating miners. There should be an effort to keep these mines working. The coal being produced in the Nova Scotia mines should be carried on the government ships to Montreal and Toronto and stored there for use in the winter.

According to a despatch from Rome, Pope Benedict is suffering from an attack of rheumatism.

Samuel Gompers addressed the convention of the American Federation of Labor yesterday afternoon in Montreal. He said that any attempt to enforce compulsory labor by making strikes unlawful must be resisted. In discussing Canada, Mr. Gompers said that Canada was politically as independent of the United States as the United States was of Canada and industrially and economically they were bound together.

G. Forgetta, charged with the murder of Arthur Palmer, was found not guilty in Montreal yesterday. Forgetta is a cousin of Dellagi, who is still at large.

but it was shown in evidence that Forgetta had tried to disarm his cousin and was not responsible for the crime. Three hundred members from all parts of Canada are in attendance at the forty-ninth annual convention of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association which opened yesterday in Vancouver.

The supreme court of the United States held that the federal prohibition amendment and the enforcement act passed by congress were constitutional. The acts were held unconstitutional by two states but their petitions were dismissed.

Paul Heck, aged fifteen, was acquitted yesterday on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Canille Godin, killed by a bullet from a rifle fired by Heck, who was shooting sparrows. Heck is also held as a material witness in connection with the death of James Brooks, who it is alleged, was killed by Beaurgard.
