



CAUSES SERIOUS DAMAGE.

Many Persons Injured But No One Killed—Property to the Value of \$1,000,000 Destroyed—Railway Traffic Interrupted.

NEW YORK, July 26-A cable to the Herald from Turin dated Wednesday.

There was a terrible cloudburst to-day in the region of Mount Cenis Tun-nel, causing great loss of life and property and interrupting the internat-ional railway owing to washouts and the fall of rocks from the mountains. The damage is estimated at \$1,000,000. From Modane to Bordonneche the country was ravaged by the storm. Sanitary measures are rendered almost impossible at Fourneaux owing to lack of labor. The storm destroyed the electric cables, causing a lack of light and power and drinking water is scarce owing to the recent great heat.
A cloudburst accompanied by lightning destroyed the church of Leschavennes, in France, about thirty-five miles from Camberoy melting the church bells into solid mass and injur-
