NEW LIGHTING SYSTEM

to Get New System.

The train shed of the Union station is being equipped with a ne wlighting system which is being given its first test on the L. R. C. at this station. The light is what is known as a regenerative flaming arc and is much more powerful than the ordinary are light, one of the new kind being as powerful as seven of the others. A lamp of this type was given a test in the depot some time ago and proved so satisfactory that it was decided to equip the whole train shed with the min order that a thorough test should be made before installing them elsewhere. Electricians are at work today putting in four of the new lights, which will replace the fifteen old type lamps formerly used. The new system may be ready for use tonight and if not, by Monday night.
