ZEPPELIN PLANS

FOR POLAR TRIP

HAMBURG, March 6.—The Zeppelin nocth polar exploration committee met here yesterday under the presidencey of Prince Henry of Prussia. Count Zeppelin, Prof. Hergesel and Prof. Lewald vere among those present. The committee discussed the program of the summer's work, which will be dovoted to a preliminary expedition for the jurpose of studying ice conditions. The government will be asked for the use of the exploring vessel Poseidon for about two months.

The expedition will start for Spitsberg July 1 on an excursion steamer and there will transfer to the Poseidon. A Norwegian steamer will be used for the purpose of forcing an entrance into the Polar ice and the expedition will return at the end of August. Apparently no airship will be taken for summer use.

The capital stock of the bank is \$200,000, with a reserve of about \$50,000. The present directors are: Frank Todd, president; John D. Chipman, vice-president; Julius Whitlock, secretary and cashier; Pnilip Breen and John G. Murchie. 
