The Spirit of Progress Keeps the Underwood Standard Typewriter In the Lead

Official Liquidator of Roman Catholic Congregations Disolved in France, is On Trial For Theft.

Paris, June 13.—Ferdinand Edmond Duez, who was the liquidator for the Roman Catholic congregations dissolved under the law of associations, as an incident of the separation of church and state in France, and who confessed to large embezzlements, was arraigned in the court of assizes today. The charge was that of embezzling \$1,100,000 while liquidating some \$2,000,000 worth of property confiscated from the religious orders since 1903.

According to the accusation against Duez he squandered about \$50,000 and salted away the balance. Duez was arrested in March, 1910 with his private secretary, Martin Gauthier, who was released on \$8,000 bail and skipped out of the country, going, it is believed, to some part of the United States.

Duez was judicial administrator for the department of the Seine's civil tribunal. He had charge of the liquidation of the property of 13 congregations, the most important of which was the Christian Brothers, which had about 2,000 schools in France and Algeria.

Before his arrest Duez lived quietly with his wife in the Latin quarter. He said that he had speculated on the Bourse.

HE PLUNDERED WILL HUNT AS FRENCH CHURCH INDIANS DID

Official Liquidator of Roman Catholic Congregations Disolved in France, is On Trial For Theft. Kansas Men Going To Hunt Grizzly Bears With Bows And Arrows In British Columbia.

Atchinson, Kan., June 13.—A possible encounter with a grizzly bear or a mountain lion in the wilds of British Columbia does not worry James Challis or Z. E. Jackson, who are going on a hunting trip to that region armed only with bows and arrows. In fact Mr. Challis and Mr. Jackson will welcome just that kind of an encounter, and they feel confident that any animal which comes within range of their arrows will come off second best.

"I expect the most enjoyable time of my life on that trip," Mr. Challis said. "I am sure we will enjoy hunting with our primitive weapons more than the man who can stand a mile away and bring down a deer or a bear with a big express bullet. There is the same difference between hunting with a bow and arrow and with a rifle as between catching fish with a fly and in a seine."

Challis and Jackson will leave Atchinson on July 7 for Seattle. They are headed by Harry B. Richardson of Boston, who holds the world's archery record, and William H. Thompson of Seattle, also an expert archer. From Seattle they will sail up the coast of British Columbia four or five hundred miles, and when they have reached a point which appears favorable to them they will go ashore and push into the interior. The regular hunting arrow will be used by the four archers. Both Mr. Jackson and Mr. Challis are adept in the art of making arrows and a large supply which they will take has been made here at old times during the past spring and winter.

\$2,000 DOLLHOUSE IS GIFT TO QUINCY GIRL

Luxurious "Toy" is Finished in Mahogany and Handsomely Furnished Throughout.

What is probably the most luxurious doll house ever constructed has been completed by Timothy Moriarty of No. 41 Germain avenue, Quincy Point. The cost of the doll house is estimated at \$2,000. Moriarty, who is an expert cabinet maker, has been working for two years on the house. It was built for his sixteen-year-old daughter Mary, a student in the Quincy high school. This is the second doll house Moriarty built for her. The first one was constructed about nine years ago. It cost \$1,000. She uses it now as a storehouse for the furniture of the new house. The house contains nine rooms and is five feet high and three and a half feet wide, exclusive of the front and rear reception room, parlor, dining room, kitchen, library, bath and three chambers.

Finished in mahogany. The interior of the house is finished in mahogany. The latest panel work adorns the walls of the reception room. Every room is lighted by electricity and heated by steam. Leaded glass panes of different designs are used as windows. The front door has three panels with French plate glass. Electric bells are on the front and rear entrance doors. Every room is furnished appropriately. Each piece of furniture is hand made. There are thirty pieces of furniture. The kitchen contains a cooking and gas range, two set tubs and hot water boiler. The bathroom contains a tub, water closet and wash bowl. The windows in the bath room are glazed. There are closets, shelves and mantelpieces in every room. The dining room has the latest model china closet. The best of white pine clapboards have been used. The roof is shingled with red cedar shingles. Electric bells are on the front and rear entrance doors. The body of the house has been painted with five coats of yellow paint. The roof is green and the trimmings white. The blinds are painted the regulation green.

Bathrooms and Hot Water. The front piazza is constructed of paneled mahogany. Three beautiful columns support the roof of the piazza. The cellar is constructed of Italian brick.
