Brooklyn, July 12.—Ralph B. Britton, Gannasque Canoe and Motor Boat Club, lost the first international race for the historic international canoe trophy here this afternoon. At the end of the contest both canoists capsize and quickly righted their tiny craft, much to the amusement of the crowd. The second contest will be sailed over the same course tomorrow afternoon.

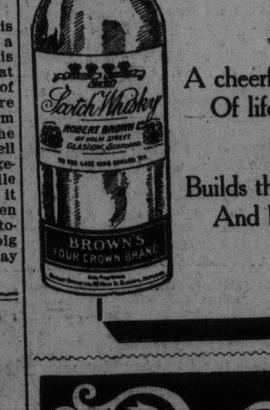
