

SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES

Miss Lillian Peterson wins Gold Medal in High School Entrance Examinations—Miss Edna Cowan second.

The High School entrance examination marks, as contained below, show that Miss Lillian Peterson, of St. Joseph's School, has won the gold medal given by the chairman of the St. John Board of School Trustees for the highest aggregate made on the entrance examination. Miss Peterson made a total of 843, and was closely followed by Miss Edna Cowan, of the same school, with a total of 841. Miss Peterson is a daughter of Arthur R. Peterson, of 23 Elmwood street, and her parents may justly be proud of their daughter's splendid record, and the young lady herself deserves the sincere congratulations of her friends.

While the mark made by each of these girls is not as high as in other years this may be partly explained by the fact that the marks were a little more severe. The number who passed the examination was 318, and 266 took the examination in 1913, and 266 in the second division, and 46 in the third division. In order to be in the first division a candidate must make a total of 866, and not go below 40 in any subject; a second division is constituted of a total of 800 and making at least 30 on every subject.

BRAS D'OR LAKES, CAPE BRETON

Canadian Government Railway's New Publication: An Excellent Folder.

Railway publications rank high in public literature, and the Canadian government railway's Cape Breton folder will take a foremost place in the 1914 productions.

Bras d'Or, or "Arm of Gold," suggested a design for the cover, and one which the combined skill of artist, engraver and printer have successfully carried out in the reproduction of the quadrilateral process of a beautiful sunset scene of the Bras d'Or Lakes, near Baddeck.

Last year a landscape artist prepared for the railway a realistic topographical map of this beautiful section of Nova Scotia, embellished with typical insets of sea bathing, trout, tuna and sword fishing, and miniature views of Mulgrave, Sydney and Baddeck.

This painting has been prominently displayed in Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, Sydney and at the present time is on exhibition in an important tour in Boston. Wherever shown it has created a wonderful interest, resulting in numerous enquiries and

actual ticket sales to this glorious summer country.

The make up of the Bras d'Or folder permits an exact reproduction of this painting, the six page centre spread being used entirely for this purpose. The descriptive portion of the folder is profusely illustrated in half tones, of very fine screen, and tells the reader how to reach Cape Breton, and just what he may expect to find there.

The Cape Breton of today is a land of summer loveliness, a vast island wherein are other tales innumerable. Its shores are washed by the billows of the Atlantic, and by the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The shining waters of the Bras d'Or Lakes divide it in twain, and provide a spacious water way through the interior. There are too, numerous rivers, streams and fresh water lakes. To this variety Cape Breton owes much of its charm; nothing is monotonous, nothing tame, and on every hand the scene is calculated to fill the mind with emotions of the keenest pleasure. No pen can adequately describe the scenery around the Bras d'Or.

The Strait of Canso—an ocean bay—Mulgrave, Port Hawkesbury, Miramichi, Inverness, St. Peter's, Arichat, Whycomagh, Baddeck, Grand Narrows, The Sydney, Mira Bay, Louisbourg, the possibilities of the development of the island, its agricultural outlook, its attractions for the devotee of the rod in ocean, lake and river, and for the yachtsman and hunter, are briefly described. A list of hotels with their accommodation and rates, is also included, altogether making the Canadian government railway's has as yet produced—and they have done much excellent work in this direction.
