London, July 9.-Field Marshal Earl Kitchener, whose conduct of the war office has been criticized by certain sections of the British press, received a very remarkable ovation from the public today on his visit to the London Guild Hall to make an appeal for recruits, and particularly for reserves, for the great army which he has raised since the outbreak of the war. From the War Office to Guild Hall great through troop-lined streets cries of welcome and confidence were shouted at him, while a meeting of business men in the Guild Hall unanimously voted confidence in his administration.

The great need of the moment, said Earl Kitchener, was men, material and money. Money, being raised by loan, was a success, he said, and he assured the meeting that the question of material was being dealt with in a highly satisfactory manner by the new Minister of Munitions. But there still remains the vital need of men he would require he declared, "men, and more men," he said, "until the enemy was

The country is in a better position than it was when the war broke out, and he made his first appeal for recruits, Earl Kitchener declared, but, he added, the position was still serious, and he made an urgent call for men to fill up the gaps which had been made in the ranks of

While at the commencement of the war, the British were short of equipment Earl Kitchener made the statement that now the War Office was able to equip all men enlisting.
