

## FOUND DEAD, BELIEVED HE WAS SLAIN

River de Chute, N. B., March 3.—Chas. Wiggin, of Listerville, was found dead about two miles from here this morning. He had been working over in Maine and came over Sunday to see his sister at Clearview. He left his sister's about 6 p. m. to walk back to the boundary line where he had left his horse. As he did not return Sunday with the horse the owner came after it Tuesday and asked about his hired man. Search was made for him Tuesday night and Wednesday morning he was found a short distance from the road with blood on his face and has every appearance of being murdered. Dr. Cummins has been sent for and will hold an inquest. Stephen Gibson, of Mars Hill, died very suddenly on Monday last. He had been stopping at his daughter's place at Clearview.

## SHOULD THE GERMANS INVADE ENGLISH SOIL

A German soldier severely wounded and tenderly cared for in No. 2 Canadian Hospital presented Rev. G. Anderson Wells, Church of England army chaplain, with about the only thing he had in his possession. It was of small value, but of enormous interest, being nothing more than a "knapsack" English dictionary, issued some months or even years ago, and distributed to that part of the German army that was expected to compose the expeditionary force to England. It is not, of course, a complete dictionary, but an abridgement containing only such English words and phrases as the invaders of the "deserted island" might be expected to require in the course of their brief visit. These selections are eloquent of the sort of treatment that would be accorded English civilians if by any chance the Kaiser could realize his dream and land an army on English soil. According to the Daily Chronicle there is internal evidence pointing to the conclusion that the dictionary was issued shortly after the Agadir incident.

**The German Speaks.**  
The English pronunciation is given phonetically, and there is a large list of place names, in which appear most points of military and naval importance. There is a map of London, and another map of the British Isles. Seven pages are devoted to a description of the uniforms and marks of the British army and naval officers. Most of the words and phrases are purely war terms, such as: Plunder, mutiny, fix bayonets, puttees, set sail, disembark, run aground, plunder, requisition, billeting, etc. Here is an idea of the racy style in which the invading Germans were instructed to address the terrified populace:  
Where does the Mayor (head local authority) live? Show me to him! Send him here!  
Give me billets for five officers, 220 men and eight horses.  
Send somebody with me who will show me the rooms for the officers.  
Is that the room for the officer? Don't you have a larger room? The rooms must be heated tomorrow. Put clean sheets on the bed.  
See that the captain may have lunch immediately after arriving.  
Have any sick horses been in this stable? Take that cow away!  
Give notice by the drum that the inhabitants will have to furnish the food for the soldiers quartered with them.  
Every soldier will be entitled to 1½ lbs. of meat—in addition to that a pint of beer. For the night every soldier must have at least a straw bed, a pillow, and a blanket.  
Take care that my orders are strictly obeyed. I shall hold you responsible for that.  
Any resistance will be severely punished.  
The community (older municipality) will have to pay a heavy contribution.  
Whoever makes an attempt on one of my soldiers will be condemned to death.  
The village will be razed.  
The Mayor will certainly be shot.  
You will answer with your life for their safety.

**Building the Populace.**  
Having secured the billet, the German soldier is instructed how to conduct himself.  
Show me to my room! That dirty hole? What do you think!  
What? You have no other room in this big house? Open the doors! I am going to choose a room myself. Here I shall stay. Take these things out of the room!  
Quick! I should like to have something to eat. A light refreshment will do for the present. Bread, butter, cheese, and some meat. Some wine, a bottle of beer, a glass of milk. I am very thirsty.  
See that I am not disturbed! Don't make any noise! Now I want to sleep for an hour. At 2 o'clock you will have dinner ready. Call me when dinner is ready.  
Looking for Churches.  
The invaders are instructed about

stabling their horses, and are told what they must say to any stragglers when on patrol duty. They are told the necessary questions to put to captive villagers in order to learn of the proximity of British troops: "Has the village been prepared for defence? Are there any barricades? Is there a church in the village?" The Germans' penchant for churches is well known, and the question provides strong internal evidence that the dictionary is an authentic German composition. Then follows the chapter on requisitioning, in which the Mayor is ordered, on penalty of death, to provide at a certain time and place an amount of food and drink sufficient for the needs of the Germans. In the event of the Mayor explaining that the hens which the invaders see running about the street are not laying the proper return for the Germans to promise to kill such unfruitful vines. It is a case of eggs or fowl.

Instructions are also given as to how the Germans should comport themselves in the larger centres of civilization. They are enjoined to seek only the best hotels, and to speak in tones of command to the waiters. "We don't like to wait a quarter of an hour for every glass of beer," is one of the open sesame, according to the knapsack dictionary. If the waiter does not make haste they are told to demand another one. If there is any noise in the restaurant they are instructed to suppress it. The German officers are advised that half-crown is the price of whatever forced accommodation may be rendered them in a restaurant. It is not definitely stated, but is assumed, that if the bill exceeds this amount the ruffian who presents it is to be shot at sunrise.—Mail and Empire.

## CHINA-JAPAN SITUATION IS CLEARING UP

Tokio Gov't not likely to  
press more than the  
eleven demands commu-  
nicated to European Na-  
tions.

Peking, Mar. 4.—Referring to the situation which has arisen in consequence of the demands upon China presented by Japan, the North China News, the foremost British newspaper in the Orient, says, editorially: "Looking at the whole situation in the cold light of a business transaction we believe that if Japan communicated eleven demands to Europe and concealed ten, those eleven are all she means to press, or hopes to get. To attempt to bully or cajole China into granting ten or more concessions, which Japan dares not reveal to Europe, would be an act so outrageous that it would never ultimately be allowed by Europe, even if we can believe that it was contemplated by Japanese statesmen."  
Meanwhile, China certainly is not called upon to consider more than what everybody officially knows. The air seems to be not a little cleared by recent developments.

this Province.

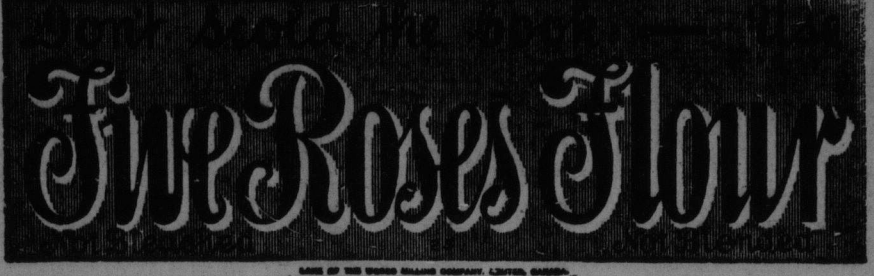
