STILL FIGHT WITH COLD STEEL IN THE VOSGES MOUNTAINS

Mr. H. Warner Allen, special correspondent of the British press with the French armies, in a despatch states: In the mountains of the Vosges men still fight today in the open, with the cold steel, and it is with the bayonet and the machine gun.

It is only in the valley that the guns are dangerous. For half a mile or more road lay exposed to the view and the German shells, just a thousand yards away, and the cars worked up to full speed to get past the danger zone as quickly as possible.

The main defence is the barbed wire, which is twisted in an intricate network round tree trunks, fallen branches and wooden stakes.
