in the wilds of New Brunswick. He
claimed to be the first man in the
world to breed moose in captivity. De-
ceased was a native of Prince Edward
Island, but had resided in this pro-
vince for many years. The Canadian
woods had been his chief hunting
ground in his active hunting days.

Live Canadian Political Views

Extracts from Articles on Con-
ditions in the Dominion
During Reconstruction.

Carlton.

(Frederick Gieseler.)

Premier Foster and his colleagues
in the Government, in opening the
Woodstock Exhibition on Tuesday,
were very liberal in their promises
of expenditures next year in Carlton
There is to be a Federal by-election
in the county this year, on October
27th next, in which Premier Foster
and the members of his Executive are
much interested. There may also be
a Provincial by-election before show-
flies. Mr. Veniot, the Minister of Pub-
lic Works, promised a large and hand-
somely designed bridge from the
Woodstock shore to the Exhibition
grounds—next year. Mr. Tweeddale
announced that, if he recommends it,
the Government will make the Wood-
stock show an annual affair—begin-
ning next year; and he felt that the
people should know that his whole
interest centered in Carlton county.
The Minister of Lands and Mines, and
another Minister, but without port-
folio, were now satisfied that there is
nothing too good for Carlton—next
year. The Premier needs only to be
asked and he will grant "what you
would have me do"—next year.
And so on. Mr. Foster evidently lacks
appreciation of the intelligence of the
people of Carlton.

Another Liberal Better.

(Ottawa Journal.)

Hon. W. S. Fielding is not the only
Liberal leader to accept the National
Liberal Convention's tariff platform
with "interpretations and reserva-
tions." Mr. J. A. Robb, the chief
Liberal Whip in the House of Com-
mons, has been giving his ideas on
things political to the Vancouver
Province and, in the course of the
conversation, said:

"I am not aware that the Liberal
party of Canada under Mr. King's
leadership is a free trade party. I
do know that the Liberal party is
a tariff reform party today as it
has always been. But a party of
free-trade. Such can not be the
case."

"A tariff reform party today as it
has always been." That will be an
interesting reading for the western
trader when he remembers the extent
to which this "tariff reform party" re-
turned the tariff reduction fifteen years
ago. Also, it should be interesting
to those in the west who, fearing a
general desertion from the ranks of
Liberalism to the ranks of the
Grain Growers, expect that there is
really no difference between the fiscal
views of the Grain Growers and the
Grifts.

"They have used our label, but the
goods are not in the cans" said Glad-
stone of a famous Tory proposal. A
similar thought must come to Mr.
Cromer and his friends as they com-
pare the Liberal platform with the
words of Fielding and Robb.

A Fruitless Debate.

(Montreal Gazette.)

The House of Commons is still de-
bating the Government resolution ex-
pressing Canadian approval of the
Peace Treaty. The discussion is
scheduled to end today, and there is
no reason why the schedule should
not be adhered to. The discussion,
certainly has furnished no such rea-
son. Beginning with a proposed ap-
proach as to the nature and ex-
tent of the responsibilities to be as-
sumed by the Dominion by reason of
its membership in the League of Na-
tions, the opposition have, with some
encouragement from the other side
of the House, come down to an en-
tirely pointless palaver on the ques-
tion of Canada's national status as af-
fected by the treaty. The propo-
sition that Canada has attained a
higher position of nationhood must
depend for its proof upon something
other than the character of the de-
bate. If Canada has indeed, risen to
a new place among the world's
nations, the fact is due to the part
which the Canadians as a people
played in the war, rather than to any
formality of membership performed
at the war's conclusion. The fact
does not was the due in these things.

Justice Must Be Even-handed.

to justice, it will be equally necessary
to arrange before the same tribunal
those who, in another sense and for
the profit of a popularity to which
they have no right, have excited the
people by unjust accusations against

ciety. Justice for all. That is the
price of peace and good order."

Routine Matters Were Considered By Common Council

A Special Meeting of Com-
missioners Was Held Yes-
terday Morning—Tax
Collections Quite
Satisfactory.

A special meeting of the Comm-
on Council was held yesterday. Com-
missioner Bullock was absent.

The report of the committee of the
whole was adopted section by section
as follows: That authority be granted
the Imperial Motor Company to install
a gasoline tank and pump at 289-300
Union street; that the request of the
Municipal Agency & Repair Co. for per-
mission to install a gasoline tank and
pump at 69 City Road be not complied
with; that the Telegraph Publishing
Co. be allowed to discontinue the
publication of their electric sign on Saturday
of each week instead of Sunday; that
the commissioner of safety be author-
ized to buy 75 yards of cloth from Mark
Kishner at \$7.35 per yard.

Petition for the renewal for three
years of these leases to stores in the
city market building was received
from the following: A. Chipman Smith
& Co., at \$1,500 per year; DeForest &
Co., \$1,000 per year; J. & J. Manson,
\$1,500 per year; and W. Pedersen,
\$1,000 per year. Referred to the com-
missioner of safety.

A complaint concerning catch basins
on Wright street, entered by W. E.
Lane, was referred to Commissioner
Fisher. The latter stated that catch
basins had been provided on Wright
street and the street put in a good
state of repair.

A petition from owners of property
on Protection street, asking that a
fence there, alleged to be a menace to
fire-fighting, be removed and the street
put in good condition, was referred to
the commissioner of public works for a
report.

A request from Charles A. Macdon-
ald for a reduction in assessment on
the Macdonald building, King street,
occupied by T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd.,
was referred to the committee of the
whole.

A request by R. A. Davidson for the
Motor Agency and Repair Co., that his
clients be permitted to install a gaso-
line tank and pump in a yard in the
rear of 69 City Road, was referred to
the commissioner of safety.

A letter from the sub-district Board
of Health, asking that the city pre-
vent trespassing on city property on
the shores of Spruce Lake by parties
likely to pollute the water supply, was
referred to the commissioner of water
and sewerage.

A letter from the sub-district Board
of Health, calling attention to nuis-
ances on the Shamrock grounds and
Elm street dump, was referred to the
commissioner of water and sewerage.

A letter from the National Confer-
ence on moral education in the
schools in relation to Canadian citi-
zenship, asking that the Council con-
sider sending a representative to
Winnipeg to participate in the con-
ference on October 20-22 next, was
referred to the mayor with power to
act.

An appeal of the N. B. Power Co.
for relief in assessment was referred
to the committee of the whole.

Authority was granted the commis-
sioner of water and sewerage to
charge an additional amount of \$1,
000.45 against maintenance in 1919.
