SHIELDS SIDING

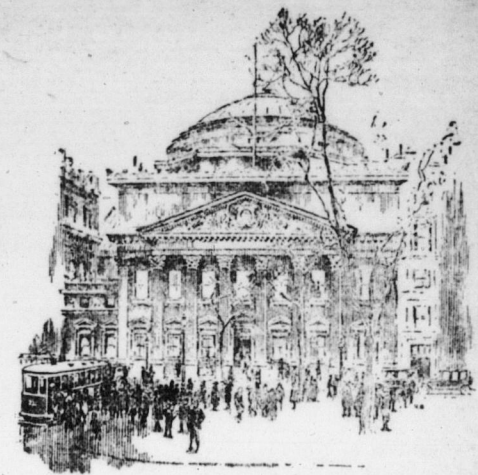
The April meeting of the Needle Club was held at Mrs. Nevin McVicar's home on April 5. There were ten members and six visitors present.
