Mr. Spackman passed his mechanical examination on Thursday and was given one hundred per cent. in handling an automobile, and leaves for England on January 1. From thirty to forty men are already enlisted in D Company of the 135th Battalion and are quartered and receiving their preliminary training at Glencoe. The number will be largely increased before January. Col. Robinson assures Major Elliot that all troops enlisting in the western section of the county will be quartered at Glencoe until the first or second week in May when the battalion will go into camp at London.

Recruits are wanted for the Middlesex Battalion, the 135th. The county is calling its sons to rally to the colors to save the Empire and world from German domination. 
