NO EVIDENCE AGAINST SOX

Chicago, Dec. 30.—Charles A. Comiskey, president of the Chicago American League baseball club today reiterated his offer of \$10,000 for direct information proving the dishonesty of any member of his team after an investigation of rumors that White Sox players in agreement with a St. Louis gambling syndicate "threw games during the 1919 season and during the world's series."

No Evidence

At the conclusion of a secret conference of officials of the team at which two St. Louis men testified, Secretary Harry Graginer announced that no evidence to support the charge had been produced.

"The St. Louis parties came here at the request of President Comiskey," said Graginer. "There had been many rumors that they could give information of value. It developed, however, that they could tell only what some one else had told them, and that they knew nothing we had not heard before."

One of the rumors was to the effect that three members of the team had approached the St. Louis gamblers with an offer to throw one game a week during the championship race for \$200 each. Another rumor was that two White Sox players had wagered money on the Cincinnati team during the world's series.
