Folksinger Harry Bellafonte, appearing in Las Vegas, said when informed of White's death:

"I can't tell you how sad am. I spent many, many hours with him in the years of my early development. He had a profound influence on my style. At the time I came along he was the only popular black folksinger and through his artistry exposed America to a wealth of material about the life and the conditions of black people that had not been sung by any other art-ist."

White was born in Green-ville, S.C., the son of a Baptist minister. His mother named him Joshua in the hope that he would become a preacher.
"Fraid I've disappointed

her," White once said. "Preachers have to know an awful lot. I never got be-

yond the sixth grade. He was seven years old when he helped a blind Nagro singer home and the singer subsequently asked Josh's mother if the boy could take him to Florida for the wint-

"My mother believed that to lead the blind would be do-ing God's work," White explained "But to a kid - well it promised fun, adventure and no regular school day in and day out. And I'd always been crazy about music."
