HAMPTON INST., Oct. 22 - The United States Bureau of Indian Affairs requested the release of Professor Clarence D. Stevens director of the School of Business during the first semester.

He is to make an economic sociological survey of opportunities for the Cherokee Indians, and for that purpose will proceed to the Cherokee Reserve in North Carolina. This survey is in the furtherance of a new policy of the government, which is intnded to develop lay leadership among the Indians, with the ultimate end in view of turning back the government of the Indians themselves as rapidly as they are fitted to exercise

That policy is expressed by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs in the statement that "The increasing use of Indians in their own official and unofficial service must be pressed without worrying" and that "With respect to unofficial Indian self service, a steadily widening tribal and local participation by the Indians in the management of their own properties and in the administration of their own service must be pursued."

The designation of a Hampton professor to do service for the Indians is in keeping with the school's traditional labors for this race. Indian education in the Hampton Insti-

BODY OF MISSIONARY COMING TO THE U.S.


