NORFOLK, Va. —(ANP) —Samuel Lewis Pettiford, 39 years old, of New York City, and brother of Mrs. Collie Carter, a well known citizen of Norfolk, 401 Chapel Street, who perished in the recent Morro Castle marine disaster, was revealed to be a Negro, thus upsetting all previous information that no Negroes were listed among the ship's passengers or crew. He was a bath steward. Pettiford was drowned as he attempted to rescue a white woman as flames were engulfing the steamer.
