POISON DOSE FATAL

Woman Mistakes Box of Deadly Oxalic Acid for Salts—Dies Within Twenty Four Hours.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 8 Mistaking a box of poison powder for Epsom Salts cost the life of Mrs. Peggy Mitchell, 38 years old. She was brought to City Hospital No. 2 Tuesday morning by her daughter, Isalle Brwn and succumbed Wednesday at 8.55 a.m. A coroner's verdict of accidental poisoning was returned in the death.

Before her death Mrs. Mitchell was able to explain her fatal blunder to hospital attendants. She stated that she went to the bathroom about 7.30 a.m., Wednesday and took a dose of what she thought was salts from a box sitting on a shelf. About an hour later she became violently ill. She returned to the bathroom and to her mortification found that the box from which she had taken the powder bore a poison label.

Doctors attributed Mrs. Mitchell's death to Oxalic acid poisoning.

TO STERILIZE NEGRO

Can Leave Germany if They Object To Operation

Life for Negroes in Germany is an anomaly, according to William T. Frary Von Bloomberg, Baron, who has recently returned from Germany where he went to become acquainted with the customs of the home of his adopted parent, the Baroness Von Blomberg.

In an interview at the office of the Boston Chronicle, Mr. Frary Von Blomberg pointed out that under the Hitler regime all Negroes and peoples not German had to be subjected to sterilization, or the alternative was that they had to get out of the country. However, in speaking to officials of the German Republic he was informed that Negroes were regarded with high esteem and that as a citizen of the country no position was closed to them.

At the present time the majority of the colored people in Germany are the children of French Colonial troops and German women during the Occupation of the Rhine.

The colored people of London are manifesting a keen interest in sport and kindred activities and have formed a club to be known as the Union Athletic Club with spacious headquarters at 541 Nelson Street. This will be a social centre for all men of the race, and will include a library, gymnasium etc. The premises are well lighted and nicely decorated and the club should gather a large number of members. Some good donations have already been received and others will be greatly appreciated. The officers elected for the current year are: President, Charles Bell; Vice President, Chas. Poindexter; Secretary, Fred Ball; assistant secretary, Allen Anderson.

MORE QUINTUPLETS

Three of Babies Born in 1907 Are Alive Robust and Healthy

SAVANNAH, Ga., Oct. 22 — (AP)—The birth of five children to a Negro woman in Emmanuel County, Ga., in 1907, has become known here through the casual mention of the attending physician, Dr. Rufus Graham, of Savannah.

If the filing of birth reports in Georgia rural section had been compulsory at that time, the birth of the five babies would have been widely known. However, it was only at a recent meeting of local doctors that Dr. Graham brought up the subject.

His fellow doctors questioned him and learned that three of the Negro quintuplets are alive now and are robust and healthy.

Dr. Graham plans to visit Emanuel County in the next few days to obtain data for the records of the American Medical Society from other persons who are familiar with the birth of the five Negroes 27 years ago.
