In an interview at the office of the Boston Chronicle, Mr. Frary Von Blomberg pointed out that under the Hitler regime all Negroes and peo ples not German had to be subjected to sterilization, or the alternative was that they had to get out of the country. Howeverx, in speaking to officials of the German Republic he was informed that Negroes were regarded with high esteem and that as a citizen of the country no position was closed to them.
