NEGRO ACCOUNTANT ARRIVES OVERSEAS

Washington, D.C.-First Negro to serve the American Red Cross as an accountant, James E. Jackson, of Camden, N.J., has arrived safely in England, the Red Cross announced this week. In his overseas post Mr Jackson will act as accountant for several Negro-staffed Red Cross clubs for servicemen on leave in the British Isles.

Before his Red Cross appointment, Mr. Jackson was employed as finance officer by the Philadelphia regional office of the War Manpower Commission, assigned to the National Youth Admnistration in the State of New Jerseey. His home was in Camden, N.J. where his wife, Mrs. Alma Gray Jackson, is a public school teacher.

For two years, Mr. Jackson had his own accounting practice in New York City and previously he served for two years with the U.S. Treasury Department in Washington.

He was graduated from high school at Fairmont, W.Va., and studied accounting at West Virginia State College, at Institute, W.Va., where he achieved "all-state scholastic standing. He was on the varsity football and basketball teams.
