Civil Disobedience Is Unnecessary

New York, N.Y. April 12.—The NAACP is using "civil disobedience" as a technique for solving the problem, Walter White, director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, expressed the hope in a letter to Senator Wayne Morse "that the courage can be mustered to do the work which will make unthinkable any campaign of civil disobedience. That since we cannot wipe out segregation by force."

Mr. White's letter of April 11, in response to a wire from Senator Morse deploring what the NAACP "encouragement" of non-payment of taxes for complete non-payment of military training program, does not specifically mention segregation.

Meanwhile on the Senate, April 12, Mr. Morse, a member of the NAACP board of directors, demanded to know whether White would go, as senatorial association, in support of Mr. White's position, because the other officials of the NAACP are going to support whatever Mr. Morse's disobedience program, since now that I shall myself from the board of that association."

Asserting that "we have selected Negroes to represent their country," Mr. White said: "We would be less and grossly derelict to the ship of the NAACP and itself if we did not support the Negro is totally segregation in the and will oppose in every and legal fashion such."

He cited the "Gallies" and discriminations against Negro troops in the 1st Central Postal Directory, charged that "the undemocratic emphasis on broadening the distinction between Negro Americans because the Navy lack the courage to end segregation. This practice throughout the world among the two-thirds of the earth who are Negroes."

Not only has Congress taken effective steps to end segregation in the services, Mr. White maintained, but also engaged in "the politics" with regard to civil rights program. "It is reported," he said, "that the Republicans are debating whether they can do on the civil rights and still attract Negroes. They are reported to favor the anti-lynching bill, the demand for abolition of the poll tax and freedom to travel without a passport, and merit through a federal government practice law."
